We have just received Notice of Intention to Drill on the well which you have designated as Eidal-#Kl-Hoxsey #1 Grace Hoxsey ~~State~~, Section 32-16N-6W. We have this morning received approval of a bond from Santa Fe giving Roy M. Eidal as principal. Therefore the operator designation on this well will have to be Roy M. Eidal, and since it is on State Land I would suggest that you change the lease designation to Grace Hoxsey-State. I am making the above changes on your Notice of Intention to Drill and sending it back to you for correction.

Will you please also instruct your surveyor to locate the well with respect to sub-division boundaries by giving footage location with respect to Section lines.

We are holding the surveyor's plats for corrected Notice of Intention to Drill.

The Commission on Government Administration was organized in 1955 by the President of the United States, Dwight D. Eisenhower, to study and report on the efficiency and effectiveness of the Federal Government.
