It is our understanding that this unorthodox well location is based upon extreme topographic conditions in the SE/4 SE/4 of said Section 28.

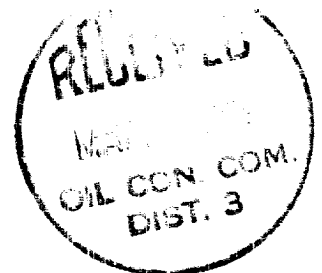

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN  
IN THE UNITED STATES  
OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE

1. The Commission on the Status of Women was established in 1961 by Executive Order of President John F. Kennedy. It was the first federal agency to be created specifically to address the concerns of women. The Commission's mandate is to study and report on the status of women in the United States and to recommend policies and programs to improve their status.

2. The Commission has held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions and recommendations from women's organizations, labor unions, and the general public. It has also conducted extensive research and has published several reports on the status of women in the United States.

3. The Commission's reports have identified many areas where women are still disadvantaged, including in the areas of employment, pay, education, and health care. It has recommended that the government take action to address these issues, including by enacting laws to prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex and by providing support for women's education and health care.

4. The Commission has also been instrumental in the development of the Equal Pay Act of 1963 and the Equal Opportunity Act of 1964. These laws have helped to improve the status of women in the United States and have set a precedent for other countries.

5. The Commission continues to work to improve the status of women in the United States and to promote gender equality.
