In reply to your letter of January 7, 1963, I am enclosing a form for a Communization which has been approved by both the United States Geological Survey and the Commissioner of Public Lands.

We approve a Communization by attaching our certificate.

I do not believe you are familiar with the entire correspondence on this Communization since you state you are faced with a dilemma if both the State and Federal agencies insist upon their own forms of Agreement. I believe you will find that in my letter of September 24, 1962, I stated "when the proper language has been inserted covering the state lands and calling for the approval by the Commissioner of Public Lands we will consider approving it."

I would request you read paragraph two of our letter of September 24, 1962, in regard to our approval of the No. 2 Wesson Communization - we did approve this form as an accommodation to Shar-Alan because of an early lease expiration but at the time of this approval we went into detail as to what would be required in the event a future Communization was presented.
