Pursuant to General Rule 104 F, Tennessee Gas Transmission Company hereby submits application and requests approval for non-standard drilling location of their Ute Mountain Tribe "A" No. 1 located 1190' PHL and 1190' PHL of Section 22, T31N, R15W in NEPM.

In support of this application, Tennessee Gas Transmission Company respectfully submits the following:

1. The well location was moved South and East from the standard location, because of extreme topographical conditions.
2. Tennessee Gas Transmission Company is the owner of an oil and gas lease covering all of Sections 21 and 22. All ownership within a radius of 790' is commensurate with the ownership under the proposed location.

Tennessee Gas Transmission Company respectfully requests that the Secretary of the Commission grant administrative approval without notice and hearing to the non-standard location hereby described.
