PHILOSOPHY 301

PHILOSOPHY 301: THE HISTORY OF PHILOSOPHY
This course is a survey of the history of philosophy from ancient Greece to the present. It covers the major figures and movements in Western philosophy, including Plato, Aristotle, Descartes, Kant, Hegel, and Nietzsche. The course is designed to provide students with a broad understanding of the development of philosophical thought over time.

The course is divided into several sections, each focusing on a different period or philosopher. The first section covers ancient Greek philosophy, from the Pre-Socratics to Plato and Aristotle. The second section covers the Middle Ages, from Augustine to Thomas Aquinas. The third section covers the Renaissance and the Enlightenment, from Descartes to Kant. The fourth section covers the 19th and 20th centuries, from Hegel and Nietzsche to Wittgenstein and Derrida.

Students will be expected to read and discuss the primary texts of the philosophers covered in the course. The course is designed to be challenging and to encourage critical thinking and discussion. Students will be required to write papers and participate in class discussions. The course is a prerequisite for several other courses in the Philosophy Department.

The course is taught by several excellent faculty members who are experts in their fields. The course is a great introduction to the history of philosophy and is highly recommended for all students interested in philosophy.
