STATEMENT OF THE CASE

By its Order No. R-8170-J the Division ordered that the Special Rules and Regulations for the Jalmat Gas Pool, as amended, be further amended by the addition of Rule No. 8. That new rule provides, notwithstanding the application of the other pool rules, that the Division shall assign a minimum gas allowable of 600 MCF/d for an Acreage Factor of 1.0 for Jalmat Pool wells. The stated order further provided that the case would be reopened in December 1993 at which time Hartman and/or operators in the pool should present evidence relevant to the continuation of a minimum gas allowable in the Jalmat Gas Pool. Hartman will establish that the Jalmat Pool's gas reserves represent a substantial and valuable economic resource to the State of New Mexico and must be continued to be developed in an orderly manner. A continued minimum allowable as now specified by Rule 8 is necessary to achieve optimum pool development, to protect correlative rights, to prevent waste and will result in the recovery of gas that would otherwise not be produced.
