ORDER OF THE COMMISSION

BY THE COMMISSION:

This cause came on for hearing at 9 o'clock a.m. April 16, 1953, at Santa Fe, New Mexico, before the Oil Conservation Commission of New Mexico, hereinafter referred to as the "Commission".

NOW, on this 21st day of May, 1953, the Commission, a quorum being present, having considered the testimony adduced and the exhibits received at said hearing, and being fully advised in the premises,

FINDS:

- (1) That due notice having been given as required by law, the Commission has jurisdiction of this cause and the subject matter thereof.
- (2) That the Dogie Canyon-Pictured Cliffs Pool, Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, as heretofore classified, defined and described, should be extended to include:

Township 26 North, Range 6 West, NMPM
N/2 Section 26

- (3) That the name of the Pettigrew-Tocito Pool in Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, should be changed to the South Blanco-Tocito Pool.
- (4) That the Aztec-Pictured Cliffs Pool in San Juan County, New Mexico, as heretofore classified, defined and described, should be extended to include:

Township 29 North, Range 11 West, NMPM
All of Section 2, N/2 Section 11

Township 30 North, Range 11 West, NMPM
E/2 Section 21

- (5) That the Blanco-Mesaverde Pool in Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, as heretofore classified, defined and described, should be extended to include:

Township 29 North, Range 6 West, NMPM
All of Sections 2, 3 and 4

(1) That the boundaries of the Dogie Canyon-Pictured Cliffs Pool, Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, be and the same hereby are extended to include:

Township 26 North, Range 6 West, NMPM
N/2 Section 26

(2) That the name of the Pettigrew-Tocito Pool in Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, be changed to the South Blanco-Tocito Pool.

(3) That the boundaries of the Aztec-Pictured Cliffs Pool in San Juan County, New Mexico, be and the same hereby are extended to include:

Township 29 North, Range 11 West, NMPM
All Section 2, N/2 Section 11

Township 30 North, Range 11 West, NMPM
E/2 Section 21

(4) That the boundaries of the Blanco-Mesaverde Pool in Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, be and the same hereby are extended to include:


Township 29 North, Range 6 West, NMPM

Section 101 - General Provisions

101.01 The purpose of this act is to provide for the orderly and efficient administration of the state government.

101.02 The provisions of this act shall apply to all state agencies and departments.

Section 102 - Definitions

102.01 As used in this act, the following definitions shall apply: (a) "Agency" means any department, office, or commission of the state government.

102.02 "Person" means any individual, partnership, corporation, or other legal entity.

Section 103 - Powers and Duties

103.01 The Governor shall have the power to appoint and remove all officers and employees of the state government.

103.02 The Governor shall also have the power to grant pardons and commutations.

Section 104 - Compensation

104.01 The compensation of all officers and employees of the state government shall be fixed by the Legislature.

104.02 The compensation of the Governor shall be fixed by the Legislature.

104.03 The compensation of the Chief Justice shall be fixed by the Legislature.

104.04 The compensation of the Justices of the Supreme Court shall be fixed by the Legislature.

104.05 The compensation of the Justices of the Appellate Court shall be fixed by the Legislature.

104.06 The compensation of the Justices of the Trial Court shall be fixed by the Legislature.
