8	Q For the record, sir, please state your
9	full name and your business address.
10	A I'm Johnnie Bowman, Eddy County Commis-
11	sioner from District II in Artesia, and I sell cars, Guy
12	Chevrolet occasionally and am County Commissioner and a few
13	other odd things.
14	In other words, I'm a retired farmer. I
	just do a little bit of everything.
15	Q And, Mr. Bowman, in your capacity as a
16	Eddy County Commissioner for District Number II, do you have
17	responsibilities with construction and maintenance of county
18	roads in Eddy County?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q And do you have a need for using water in
21	connection with the construction or maintenance of those
22	roads?
	A Yes, sir.
23	Q Would you describe to the Examiner exact-
24	ly what it is that you use water for in connection with
25	A Mostly it's in the oil field. That deep

sand over there, unless we have some type of water, we can't
work on the roads when they're dry. That sand, it won't
hold together unless we put water on it, and that salt
water, believe it or not, it acts like a -- as a cement. It

polls the sand together and it holds it better than fresh
water does even, and there's no fresh water available over
there, and the salt water is the only source that we have to

put on those roads.

And if we don't work with the roads it gets where they can't get over it with those trucks to haul the oil with.

Q And, Mr. Bowman, what portion of Eddy
County is the District Number II?

A It's about half of it.

Q And --

A North half.

Q -- is it the major oil and gas producing area of the county?

A Yes, sir.

Q And would you describe to the Examiner the application, how you actually use water? How -- how do you apply the water to the roads?

A With the water trucks and spray bars. We spray the water on the ground and follow up with the road graders and mix it together and smooth it out.

Q And have you caused the Eddy County Road Department to do a study for the year, August of 1983 for

7 1 sources? 2 It says here that if this figure Α 3 is divided by eight, the actual number of months 4 that water was hauled, it would give us an average monthly 5 cost of \$7,045.50. 6 No water was hauled in November as this 7 was our annual cleanup month. 8 If the average monthly cost of \$7,045.50 9 is multiplied by twelve, the number of months in a year, it would give us an annual average cost of \$84,546 for the 10 waste waters usage. 11 Now, by waste water usage, can you 12 describe what the county has been using for water for road 13 construction and maintenance since August of 1983? 14 Α We -- up till here awhile back we was 15 using salt water. 16 And was that produced water from oil 0 17 gas wells? Yes, sir. 18 And was that costing the county anything Q 19 to use that water? 20 Α No, sir, the -- mostly Rowland Trucking 21 and Broome Trucking and INW Trucking hauled it from the --22 they were hired to take care of the salt water from the 23

different wells, and they'd load that up in their trucks and

bring it out and spray it on the road for us, and didn't

cost us anything. The oil companies was paying for it.

spraying opertions, because very, very little actual use of water on the ground itself as they're using it.

Q Would the use of seven to ten loads, each load consisting of 150 barrels of produced water per mile of road construction and repair?

A I don't think so, in my opinion. That comes out to about nine gallons per foot in spreading, very, very little use of water.

Of course we all know that salt does not evaporate. It remains in the soil but one or two times a year use that they're making of the water is going to have very, very little effect, if any, on any ground water supplies.

Q And, Mr. Minton, compared to the use of water for irrigation of farms, what would be the difference between using produced water for road maintenance and construction as opposed to irrigating for farms?

A You can't -- can't compare it. Irrigation of farms, of which there is a lot of farms being irrigated with salt water at the present time in the valley, they use three or four feet a year per acre and more during some seasons, and that salt water is applied to the ground at the rate of about two to four tons per acre, and it remains in the soil and as irrigation continues that is pushing that salt on down into the ground water system.

Q So therefore, in your opinion, agricultural irrigation has a more adverse effect to shallow aqui-

2	fers than the use Mr. Bowman proposes?
3	A Hundred times.
4	Q Okay, Mr. Minton, have you testified be-
5	fore this Commission before as an expert?
	A Yes, sir.
6	Q And based on your personal knowledge,
7	will the construction of roads and maintenance of roads Mr.
8	Bowman refers to benefit the production of oil and gas in
9	Eddy County?
10	A I think it would benefit much more than
11	the adverse effects would come out.

So under these conditions you Okay. 5 don't feel that there's a risk to shallow fresh water. 6 I sure don't. Ά 7 0 Is there a lot of shallow fresh water in 8 Eddy County? 9 Yes, there is in sections. Now, you take north Eddy County, east of the river you've got very, very 10 little water of any type. West there will be, yes. 11 0 And those are where the oilfield roads 12 are? 13 Α Yes, sir. 14 Q Okay. 15 Α Mr. Bowman advised me that they probably 16 use 25 percent in those areas of this salt water. 17 West of the river a lot of the use, tells me, is fresh water. 18 Even if all the water used west of 19 river in north Eddy County were salt water, it would have 20 very, very little adverse effects on the water system. 21 With the amount of rainfall that occurs 0 22 in Eddy County is there enough rainfall to wash the salt out 23 of the roads and --24 Α Average rainfall down there would prob-25 ably be around 11 or 12 inches; a lot of years, less, and I

can see very little rainfall water being -- picking up the salt and pushing it on down.

MR. STAMETS: Any other questions of this witness? He may be excused.

MR. DIAMOND: Thank you.

MR. STAMETS: Do you have any-

thing further?

MR. DIAMOND: Just to summar-

ize, if I may, Mr. Examiner.

Mr. Bowman was serious when he said that we have no objection to a proposed system of fines if Eddy County does violate the -- your order, the Commission's order. This Commission has probably the first commission in the State of New Mexico that has imposed sanctions on itself for official acts, where each of the Commissioners had to pay \$1000 for a road that was built not according to Hoyle, so they're serious when they say they're responsible for compliance with these rules.

In addition the Sheriff did tell the Commission, as is reflected in the minutes of the Commission hearing, that he will be more than happy to work directly with Mr. Clements and the Division in setting up an enforcement program to prevent the unauthorized, unlawful dumping of produced water and other materials in Eddy County.

So we're serious about not only wanting to comply with the law but wanting to get the bene-

fits of using the produced water, which is \$85,000 a year for the taxpayers of Eddy County, like every other county in the state, especially the mineral producing counties, we're very hard pressed right now for revenue with the drop off in revenues that the state is also receiving, and we need that saving.

MR. STAMETS: Mr. Diamond,

would you like to offer your exhibits?

MR. DIAMOND: And I will offer

those exhibits.

MR. STAMETS: They will be ad-

mitted.

MR. BOWMAN: May I say some-

thing, please?

MR. STAMETS: You certainly

may, Mr. Bowman.

MR. BOWMAN: When I said probably 25 percent of the water would be used west of the river, I was considering the south end with it, because there's very little of the water that's used west of the river up in the north end. What is used is out of the valley, back way out west, and every time we blacktop a road out there, why, we're done with it, using water then.

Oh, we might get a flood or something or other and need to rebuild a road or something, but it is very occasionally and that underground water basin in the north end of Eddy County, that's where the main un-
