8-5/8" 32# 8-thd. New Seamless casing was set in this well at 2442' and cemented by the Halliburton Method with 500 sacks.

Casing and fittings will be tested with 1200# pu up pressure and allowed to stand undisturbed for thirty minutes. If no drop in pressure results the cement will then be drilled out of the casing and the same test of 1200# press ure again applied and allowed to stand undisturbed for thirty minutes. If no drop in pressure results the drilling will then be resumed.

# THE HISTORY OF THE UNITED STATES

## CHAPTER I: THE EARLY YEARS

The first European settlers in North America were the Pilgrims, who arrived in 1620 on the ship the Mayflower. They established the Plymouth colony in Massachusetts. Other early colonies were founded by the Dutch, French, and Spanish.

The American Revolution began in 1775 with the Battles of Lexington and Concord. The Continental Congress fled to Lancaster and then to York, Pennsylvania, before moving to Philadelphia. The Declaration of Independence was signed on September 17, 1776.

The war continued until 1781, when the British evacuated Philadelphia and moved back to New York City. The Battle of Red Bank was a significant defeat for the British, leading to the evacuation of Fort Mifflin and the city of Lancaster.

The war ended with the signing of the Treaty of Paris in 1783, which recognized the independence of the United States. The new nation was a young democracy, and the Constitution was drafted in 1787.
