Gentlemen:

Reference is made to your application dated January 31, 1958, for administrative approval of an exception to Rule 309 (a) of the Rules and Regulations of the Oil Conservation Commission to permit the commingling of the oil produced from the following described State of New Mexico oil and gas leases in the Kemnitz Wolfcamp Pool, to-wit:

State of New Mexico OG-377 covering the NW/4 of Section 21  
State of New Mexico OG-378 covering the SA/4 of Section 21  
State of New Mexico OG-380 covering the NW/4 of Section 28

all in Township 16 South, Range 34 East, NMPM, Lea County, New Mexico.

By the authority vested in me under the provisions of Rule 309 (b) of the Rules and Regulations of the Oil Conservation Commission of New Mexico, I hereby authorize you to commingle the production from the above-described leases from the Kemnitz Wolfcamp Pool in a common tank battery.

Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the production of more than eight wells into a single tank battery.
