ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER
OF THE OIL CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Under the provisions of Order No. R-2403, Continental Oil Company has made application to the Commission on February 23, 1967, for permission to expand its MCA Unit Water Flood Project in the Maljamar Pool, Lea County, New Mexico.

NOW, on this 15th day of March, 1967, the Secretary-Director finds:

1. That application has been filed in due form.
2. That satisfactory information has been provided that all offset operators have been duly notified of the application.
3. That no objection has been received within the waiting period as prescribed by Order No. R-2403.
4. That the proposed injection wells are eligible for conversion to water injection under the terms of Order No. R-2403.
5. That the proposed expansion of the above-referenced water flood project will not cause waste nor impair correlative rights.
6. That the application should be approved.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED:

That the applicant, Continental Oil Company, be and the same is hereby authorized to inject water into the Grayburg-San Andres formation through the following described wells for purposes of secondary recovery, to wit:

MCA Unit Well No. 18 located in Unit D,
MCA Unit Well No. 20 located in Unit B,
MCA Unit Well No. 52 located in Unit H,
MCA Unit Well No. 54 located in Unit F,
MCA Unit Well No. 59 located in Unit J,
MCA Unit Well No. 100 located in Unit P,
MCA Unit Well No. 102 located in Unit N,
MCA Unit Well No. 242 located in Unit E,
all in Section 19, Township 17 South, Range
32 East, NMPM.

MCA Unit Well No. 104 located in Unit D,
MCA Unit Well No. 107 located in Unit B,
MCA Unit Well No. 159 located in Unit H,
MCA Unit Well No. 162 located in Unit F,
MCA Unit Well No. 164 located in Unit L,
MCA Unit Well No. 166 located in Unit J,
MCA Unit Well No. 215 located in Unit P,
MCA Unit Well No. 217 located in Unit N,
all in Section 30, Township 17 South, Range
32 East, NMPM.

PROVIDED HOWEVER, That applicant shall inject water through tubing with packers set well below the top of the cement surrounding the producing casing in the above-described well.
