It is our understanding that the Tecite Dome Pennsylvanian "D" Tank Battery for said lease was inadvertently constructed on your Jason Navajo "AR" Lease, which comprises all of Section 27, Township 26 North, Range 18 West.

Inasmuch as there will be no intercommunication of the handling, separating, treating, or storage facilities designated to each lease, the aforesaid exception to Rule 309-A of the Commission Rules and Regulations is hereby approved pursuant to Rule 309-C.

TEXACO Inc. respectfully requests administrative approval for an exception to the Commission's Rule No. 309-A to allow for off-lease storage and measurement of crude oil and gas produced from its Navajo Tribe "AL" Lease.

The Navajo Tribe "AL" Lease consists of Section 28, Township 26 North, Range 18 West, San Juan County, New Mexico. Production is derived from the Tocito Dome Pennsylvanian "D" Field. At the time the tank battery was constructed, it was inadvertently located on the adjacent Navajo "AR" Lease which consists of Section 27, Township 26 North, Range 18 West. The Navajo Tribe "AL" and "AR" Leases have identical working and royalty interests. A plat showing both leases and the wells and facilities thereon is attached.

At the present time there is no production from the Navajo Tribe "AR" Lease so no commingling is involved. It is planned to request permission to commingle production if and when production is established on the Navajo Tribe "AR" Lease.

Also attached is a copy of a letter sent by registered mail to Mr. John A. Anderson, Regional Oil and Gas Supervisor of the U.S.G.S. requesting his approval of the off-lease storage. Your early consideration of this request is solicited.

TEXACO Inc. respectfully requests your authority to allow off-lease storage and measurement of crude oil and gas produced from the Navajo Tribe "AL" Lease (14-20-0603-8104). At the time of construction the tank battery was inadvertently located on the adjacent Navajo Tribe "AR" Lease (14-20-0603-0103). The Navajo Tribe "AL" Lease consists of Section 28, T-25-N, R-18-W, San Juan County, New Mexico. The Navajo Tribe "AR" Lease consists of the adjoining Section 27. The royalty and working interest of the two leases is identical. Production is obtained from the Tocito Dome Pennsylvanian "D" Field.

At the present time there is no production from the Navajo "AR" Lease so commingling will not be involved. If and when production is established on the Navajo "AR" Lease a separate commingling permission request will be made.

A plat showing the leases and the wells and facilities thereon is attached. Since off-lease measurement and storage requires an exception to the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission Rule No. 309-A, TEXACO Inc. is filing for administrative approval for an exception to this rule. The New Mexico rules provide for a twenty day waiver period on applications of this nature. If the supervisor finds no objection to the proposal it would be appreciated if Mr. A. L. Porter, Jr., Secretary-Director of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission be notified.

Your early consideration and approval of this request will be appreciated.

Your letter of October 7 requests approval to allow storage facilities for wells drilled on your "AL" lease in sec. 28, T. 26 N., R. 18 W., San Juan County, New Mexico, Navajo lease 14-20-0603-8104, to be placed on your "AR" lease in sec. 27, T. 26 N., R. 18 W., Navajo lease 14-20-0603-8103.

According to your letter the off lease storage is necessitated due to inadvertently locating the tank battery in sec. 27 during construction.
