It has come to the attention of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission that the well you are causing to be drilled in the SE/4 SW/4 of Section 24, Township 20 North, Range 26 East, NMPM, Harding County, New Mexico, has been temporarily abandoned as of May 11, 1960. In checking the well record of the subject well, it is noted that you have not applied for temporary abandonment approval. If drilling operations have been suspended rather than the well temporarily abandoned, your attention is called to Rule 202 C of the Rules and Regulations of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission which states "When drilling operations have been suspended for 60 days, the well shall be plugged and abandoned unless a permit for temporary abandonment shall be obtained from the Commission."

On October 8, 1959, this office received and approved Notice of Intention to Plug for the subject well as filed by A. M. Belcher. It is the wish of the Commission that the approved plugging program be disregarded until a report of the present status of the well has been received by this office. It is also desired that Rule 107 be complied with inasmuch as you have disregarded the filing of forms required after all casing strings are run.

1. The first step in the process of the investigation is the identification of the subject. This is done by the investigator who is assigned to the case. The investigator will first identify the subject by name, address, and date of birth. This information is then used to locate the subject's current residence. Once the subject's residence is located, the investigator will attempt to gain access to the premises. This may be done by knocking on the door and asking to speak to the subject. If the subject is not home, the investigator will leave a message and return at a later date. If the subject is home, the investigator will attempt to gain access to the premises. This may be done by asking the subject for permission to enter. If the subject refuses, the investigator will attempt to gain access by other means, such as using a key or forcing the door open. Once access is gained, the investigator will conduct a search of the premises for evidence. This may include looking through drawers, closets, and other areas where evidence might be hidden. If evidence is found, it will be seized and taken to the laboratory for analysis. The results of the analysis will then be used to identify the subject and determine the nature of the crime.
