
In November of 1995, Apache Corporation received approval for an access road and a pipeline from the JAT 127 #155 to the JAT 127 #30 location. This was due to major erosion on the #155 access road and the water damage erosion of the gas pipeline that spans the wash east of the #155 location. In 1996, the access road from the #155 to #30 was put in, but the pipeline was not.

At this time Apache Corporation is requesting approval to install the 3" poly gas production pipeline, to be laid along the access road, from the #155 to the #30 location. The line will be tied into the ElPaso Field Service's Apache 154/155 CDP.



#### Gentlemen:

This is in follow up to Apache Corporation's November 13, 1995 letter to Kurt Sandoval regarding the Apache 155 - Road/Pipeline Right-of-way.

On November 17, 1995, William Julian contacted us about getting approval to start the road construction which was more urgently needed. We said it was alright so long as Kurt Sandoval, Director, Jicarilla Apache Tribe, Environmental Protection Office, was included in getting tribal approval for these activities. First as being the head of the environmental department, and second as a livestock owner familiar with the proposed locations.

On November 20, 1995, we talked with Kurt Sandoval about this particular request. He said the road was needed and it would essentially cross a sagebrushed area, and had no objections.

As for the archeological clearance and the environmental assessment, we noted required clearances by (1) Apache Corporation's contact and conversation with Kurt Sandoval on the environmental requirements as contained in the November 13, 1995 letter, and (2) the Albuquerque Area Director's November 7, 1995 letter giving archeological clearance, with stipulations.

Therefore, we provide our approval for the project Apache 155 - Road/Pipeline Right-of-way. Please provide us with maps of definite location.





Dear Mr. Julian:

We have reviewed the cultural resources survey report dated November 1, 1995, entitled, "An Archaeological Survey of an Access Road/Pipeline in Rio Arriba County, New Mexico, Conducted for Apache Corporation (L55 Road/Right-of-Way Project)." This was prepared by Mr. Gifford Velarde, Velarde Energy Services, and is numbered CR-95-459. We understand that you also have a copy of this document.

The report, dealing with Jicarilla Apache Tribal lands, states that no surface evidence of potentially significant cultural resources was encountered during the requisite field inspection. The project is small in size, and in a location where we do not expect that it will impact any areas of traditional religious or cultural importance to the Jicarilla Apache Tribe. Therefore, we have determined that no effect on any National Register listed or eligible cultural resources will result from the proposed action. We have notified the New Mexico State Historic Preservation Officer of our determination and provided a copy of this report for their files.

The proposed undertaking is in compliance with the provisions of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and may proceed under the following stipulations:

- All land-altering activities will be confined to the area surveyed for cultural resources.
- 2. If subterranean cultural resources are encountered, all land-altering activities will be halted and the Area Archeologist notified immediately.

These stipulations must be followed or project suspensions will be issued. The responsibility of project sponsors is to notify subcontractors of the project boundaries and stipulations. Any change in project boundaries will require additional survey and repetition of the compliance procedures.

This letter only serves as notification that National Historic Preservation Act Section 106 compliance has been completed for the subject project. It does not constitute approval of right-of-way or concurrence in the proposed activities by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA). This compliance is one of several legal requirements which must be accomplished before BIA approval of rights-of-way, easements, or other land use contracts for land modifying projects.
