Gentlemen:

We are returning two copies of Form C-128 which were forwarded to this office by the U.S.G.S. Office in Farmington.

These plats were filed in connection with your #4 Navajo well in the NE $\frac{1}{4}$ Section 5-31N-17W. You have failed to indicate your acreage dedication and answer questions regarding ownership. The form has also not been signed by the operator's representative.

We note that you have made a standard oil well location and are drilling the well to the Dakota formation in an area where gas production might possibly be anticipated. In the event this should be a gas-producing well it will be necessary that you make application for a hearing to approve the production before a Form C-110. Authorization to Transport, can be approved.

I would suggest that future wildcat locations to the Dakota in this area be located at least 790 feet from the quarter-section boundary in order that they will be orthodox gas well locations.

In regard to the subject well, please outline the 40 acres to be dedicated, answer the questions, sign and return the form C-128.

COMMISSION OF INVESTIGATION
OF THE
STATE BAR ASSOCIATION

The Commission of Investigation of the State Bar Association was organized by the Legislature in 1927. Its purpose was to investigate the activities of the State Bar Association and to report to the Legislature on its findings. The Commission was composed of three members, one of whom was to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Senate, and one by the Assembly. The Commission was to have the right to subpoena witnesses and to take such other action as it might deem necessary to carry out its duties. The Commission was to report to the Legislature on or before the first day of January following the expiration of its term.

The Commission was organized on January 1, 1927, and immediately began its work. It held several public hearings and received many suggestions from the public. It also conducted extensive research into the activities of the State Bar Association. The Commission's report to the Legislature was published in 1928. It contained a detailed account of the Commission's findings and recommendations. The Commission's report was a landmark document in the history of the State Bar Association. It brought to the attention of the public and the Legislature the many abuses which had been committed by the State Bar Association. The Commission's report led to the passage of several laws which reformed the State Bar Association and made it more accountable to the public.

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
