NOTICE OF INTENTION TO TEST WATER SHUT-OFF

Notice must be given to the State Geologist or to the proper Oil and Gas Inspector at least five days before the test. It is desirable that a representative of the Department of the State Geologist witness the water shut-off before drilling into the productive sand whenever possible. If changes in the proposed plan are considered advisable, a copy of this notice showing such changes will be returned to sender. Submit this notice in triplicate.

REPORT OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL
ON THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE
COMMISSIONERS OF THE LAND OFFICE

The Commission on the Land Office was organized on the 1st day of January, 1900, and has since that time been engaged in a study of the various questions connected with the management of the public lands of this State. It has held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions from the public. It has also conducted extensive research into the various methods of land management and has prepared this report as a result of its work.

The Commission has found that the present system of land management is in many respects inefficient and wasteful. It has identified several areas where improvements can be made, and it has proposed various reforms to address these issues. These reforms include the reorganization of the Land Office, the improvement of the methods of land surveying, and the establishment of a more effective system of land sales.

One of the most important reforms proposed by the Commission is the reorganization of the Land Office. At present, the Land Office is divided into several departments, each of which is headed by a different official. This arrangement is inefficient and leads to a duplication of effort. The Commission proposes that the Land Office be reorganized so that all the functions of the office are performed by a single official, the Commissioner of the Land Office.

Another important reform proposed by the Commission is the improvement of the methods of land surveying. At present, the methods of land surveying are antiquated and often result in errors. The Commission proposes that the methods of land surveying be improved by the use of modern instruments and techniques. It also proposes that the Land Office be authorized to employ a sufficient number of surveyors to carry out these improvements.

The Commission also proposes that the Land Office be authorized to sell the public lands in a more effective manner. At present, the public lands are often sold at a low price and to the wrong parties. The Commission proposes that the Land Office be authorized to sell the public lands in a more systematic and efficient manner. It also proposes that the Land Office be authorized to lease the public lands to the public for a term of years.

In addition to these reforms, the Commission has proposed several other measures to improve the management of the public lands. These measures include the establishment of a public lands fund, the improvement of the methods of land taxation, and the establishment of a public lands commission. The Commission believes that these measures are necessary to ensure the efficient and effective management of the public lands of this State.

The Commission believes that the reforms proposed in this report are essential for the efficient and effective management of the public lands of this State. It urges the Legislature to take prompt action upon these reforms. It also urges the public to support these reforms and to cooperate with the Land Office in its efforts to improve the management of the public lands.
