#### **ABSTRACT**

On April 3, 4, and 27 and May 5, 1990, the Division of Conservation Archaeology of the San Juan County Museum Association completed an archaeological survey of the proposed Bannon Federal 14-6 well pad and access road for Bannon Energy, Inc. The survey area is located south of Lybrook, Rio Arriba County, New Mexico and is partly under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management and partly under the jurisdiction of the Navajo Nation with a fee surface and Federal minerals. Approximately 18.28 acres were intensively inventoried.

Three sites and two isolates were encountered and recorded during survey of the project area. The isolates and two of the sites are located near the proposed well pad with the remaining site located on the abandoned well pad.

The documentation of the isolates in the field is considered sufficient to exhaust their research potential. DCA-90-105 is located on the abandoned well pad and will not be affected by construction activities. DCA-90-196 is located within the buffer zone of the abandoned project area, approximately 60 ft south of the proposed Federal 14-6 well pad's cultural buffer zone, and will not be affected by construction activities. DCA-90-156 is situated on the southeast slope of a ridge which forms a natural barrier between it and the proposed well pad. It is recommended that construction activities be restricted to the staked well pad in the southeast corner area. This will provide further protection for DCA-90-156. Archaeological clearance is recommended with the above stipulation.

#### INTRODUCTION

On April 3, 4, and 27 and May 5, 1990, the Division of Conservation Archaeology (DCA) of the San Juan County Museum Association conducted an archaeological survey for Bannon Energy, Inc. of Houston, Texas. Jeff Holcomb of Holcomb Oil and Gas requested the survey and administered the project for Bannon Energy, Inc. Byron P. Johnson administered the project for DCA.

In recognition of the limited, nonrenewable nature of archaeological remains, the federal government has enacted legislation that is designed to conserve and protect these resources. The principal legislation includes the Antiquities Act of 1906 (PL 52-209), the Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (PL 89-665) and as amended (PL 96-515), the National Environmental Act of (PL 91-852), the 1971 Executive Order No. 11593, the Archaeological and Historical Conservation Act of 1974 (PL 93-291), and the Archaeological Resources Protection Act of 1979 (PL 96-95). In addition, the Navajo Nation and the states of Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, and Colorado have enacted laws to ensure compliance with federal legislation and to protect archaeological resources within their jurisdiction. Work undertaken in the course of this project is intended to comply with these statutes and is governed by the stipulations of Cultural Resource Use Permit 7-2920-90-U (NM BLM) and Navajo Nation Permit B8990.

Supervisor Cindy J. Bunker, assisted by Valerie Green, Lisa Rohrer, Dave Bunker, and Jenny Montero, DCA archaeologists, surveyed the project area for cultural remains.

#### **METHODS**

The area was surveyed by walking parallel transects spaced 10 m apart across the well pad and on both sides of the flagged access road. A construction zone of 50 ft (15 m) was added to each side of the well pad. A buffer zone of 100 ft (30 m) was added to each side of the well pad and construction zone, and a buffer zone of 50 ft (15 m) was added to each side of the access road. The archaeologists recorded all cultural remains. Those whose information potential exceeded what could be extracted during the survey phase were assigned site status. Other cultural remains were documented as isolated loci (IL). Pertinent environmental data were also recorded.

In addition to field inspection, the archaeologists conducted a search of the records at the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Farmington Resource Area office and at DCA to determine if any sites had been recorded in the project area. Van Valkenburgh (1974) was consulted to determine whether any Navajo sacred places are within the project area. Site and project records required by the BLM, the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division, and the Navajo Nation were completed.

### PREVIOUSLY RECORDED SITES

The records check revealed six previously recorded sites within one mile of the proposed project area. Those sites are shown on Supplement 1A which is provided to the BLM and the Navajo Nation only. None of the sites are within 1000 ft of the project.





Description: The proposed well pad area, located on BLM lands, is in the bottomlands of a tributary drainage of Escrito Canyon. It is situated against the northeast side of the base of an unnamed mesa with the slope forming the west and southwest boundaries of the well pad. Soil's consist of alluvial sands and the vegetation consists of sage (Artemisia tridentata) in the flats and a sparse scatter of pinyon (Pinus edulis) and juniper (Juniperus sp.) along the slopes. Broadleaf yucca (Yucca baccata), narrowleaf yucca (Yucca angustissima), currant bushes (Ribes sp.), and gambel oak (Ouercus gambelii) were also present. The ground level elevation is 7150 ft above sea level.

The proposed access road will be approximately 1400 ft long and will extend in a northeasterly direction from the proposed well pad to another well pad, the Bannon Federal 14-5. Portions of the proposed access road will be on Navajo Nation fee surface land.





Cultural Resources: Three archaeological sites, DCA-90-105, DCA-90-156, and DCA-90-196 (Figures 3, 4, and 5), and two isolated loci were encountered and recorded during survey of the project area. One site (DCA-90-105) is located on the abandoned location. The second site, (DCA-90-196) is located within the buffer zone of the abandoned well pad, approximately 60 ft south of the proposed well pad's cultural buffer zone. The third site (DCA-90-156) and both isolates, consisting of a Dinetah sherd and lithics, are located within the proposed well pad project area.




