Administrative Order PC-81

Reference is made to your letter of June 7, 1963, wherein you request an amendment to Administrative Order PC-81 to substitute South Brunson Ellenburger production for Drinkard production in the commingling authority granted by that order. It is our understanding that your A. H. Blinbry (NCT-3) Lease, which comprises the N/2 NW/4, SW/4 NW/4, and NW/4 NE/4 of Section 31, Township 22 South, Range 38 East, Lea County, New Mexico, is no longer productive from the Drinkard Pool, but Well No. 3 is being completed to produce from the South Brunson Ellenburger and Blinbry Oil Pools. It is our further understanding that the production from all zones will be metered prior to commingling and that due to a diversification in royalty payments to the United States Federal Government, Blinbry production from Well No. 2 located in Unit B of Section 31 will also be metered prior to commingling.

By the authority vested in me under the provisions of Rule 303, Administrative Order PC-81 is hereby amended and you are authorized to commingle the production from the aforesaid pools on said lease in the above-described manner. Provided however, that the installation shall be operated in accordance with the provisions of the Commission "Manual for the Installation and Operation of Commingling Facilities," including the requirement for non-reset counters on the meters.
