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Gentlemen:

On December 1, 1967, Windfohr Oil Company requested your approval to commingle Grayburg oil production from their dually completed well #38 Grayburg Jackson (San Andres) Unit located in the NE/4 NE/4 of Section 12, Township 17 South, Range 30 East, on Lease LC-055264 with Grayburg production on segregated Lease NM-2747 (formerly LC-055264) in Section 1, Township 17 South, Range 30 East, Eddy County, New Mexico. The United States Geological Survey gave their temporary approval by letter dated January 5, 1968 until April 1, 1968. The New Mexico Oil Conservation Commission gave their temporary approval by letter dated January 18, 1968, Administrative Order PC-343, also until April 1, 1968. Since that time we have filed well tests on Oil Conservation Commission Forms #C-127 and these have been furnished to both the Oil Conservation Commission and United States Geological Survey.

This well is still being dually produced and at the present time it is pumping 10 barrels of oil per day from the Grayburg formation and 2 barrels of oil per day from the San Andres formation. We believe it is evident by this time that this is a marginal well in both zones and we are hereby requesting your permanent approval to continue commingling this Grayburg oil production.
