Dear Mr. Staley:

Request has been made that those wells having export connections within the Artesia-Grayburg-Jackson-Malgamar area be allowed to produce between September 18 and October 15, 1939, 45,000 barrels of oil for export purposes only so as to fill the pipe line in order that the delivery of export oil will not be unduly delayed.

Permission is herewith granted to produce 45,000 barrels of oil for export purposes only from those wells having export connections within the Artesia-Grayburg-Jackson-Malgamar area for the purpose of filling the pipe line in order to prevent undue delay in accomplishing export, subject, however, to the following conditions: The permission herein is not to be interpreted as an extra allowable, but merely permission to make the runs as advance allowables to be charged back against the allowables of the wells making such advance runs. This permission is intended to alleviate an emergency, to-wit, the filling of the pipe line to prevent delay in making export delivery.

This letter shall be the authority of the Proration Umpire to permit the runs as indicated in the permission granted hereinabove.


Dear Carl:

My dear Mr. Livingston:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of September 8 and a copy of Order No. 197 of the Commission terminating the suspension of production of petroleum in New Mexico, and thank you therefor.

The suspension of production appears not to have seriously injured the lessees, the purchasers or the users of petroleum products. I am afraid it furnished momentum to federal regulation of the oil business as will enable the sponsors of acts pending in the congress to procure the passage thereof. If it has, I suspect such regulation will never be released by the federal government. The courts in recent years have gone far in sustaining federal regulation of businesses formerly considered local and the power of regulation to be vested in the states.

It appears to me that if the courts are consistent they will hold substantially all business of every kind to be subject to regulation by the congress. For the most part, all of the wheat, corn, coal, cattle, hogs, sheep, lumber, coal, oil, and manufactured products move in interstate commerce. If our constitution gives the congress such jurisdiction and authority and such was intended by
