work. As I understand it, you shall not be aware of all pertinent
details to be involved in the proposed work until your crews have
gone into each well and actually discovered the condition of each
well, i.e. status of the casing, whereabouts of leakage sources
vertically, etc.

Mind you, I will not say that gun perforation of the
casing will be the successful solution to your problem in any one
or all of the wells. It is an alternative and if proven successful
in whatever case it is applied, well and good. If unsuccessful,
and the new openings resulting allow the admission of an unfavor-
able medium, then it will be to your advantage to get the perfora-
tions plugged by squeeze cementing which may sometimes prove

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Asive, depending on the size of the void or annulus behind the casing. a shall have to consider all prevalent circumstances and factors as they are revealed and act accordingly.

You mention a concern in Dallas which does gun perforating. You may be able to call out Lane-Wells Company or Schlumberger Well Surveying Corporation at Lubbock, Texas to do your perforating. This is not as far as Dallas and may be more economical for these service companies as a rule charge a flat mileage rate for a round trip to the well from their shops from whence their units are dispatched.

As far as the actual work to be done, I suggest that you have a competent engineer or well man, sufficiently versed in these remedial operations, to supervise all work done.

Similarly you should take the necessary steps to assure the proper installment of individual metering devices for all wells which you intend to produce.

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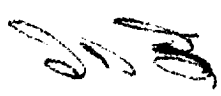
