Dear Mr. Hawthorne:

This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 29 and April 20.

I wish to apologize for the lengthy delay in answering these.

The reporting of the taking of CO₂ gas to us by the industry is not complete. We have requested that this be done and have received but very little cooperation in this respect.

I wish to advise that we are at this time taking the necessary steps to correct this situation and anticipate that it will be corrected within 30 days.

You state that there are two wells other than the Iceco DeBaca No. 1 which is located according to a surveyors plat in the NWNE 31-20N-31E, 983 feet south of the north line and 1966 feet west of the east line of the above mentioned section. However, our records show that only one other well was drilled, this is known as the Iceco Libby No. 1 SWNE 31-20N-31E. The location is 1650 from the north and 1650 from the east. If any other well has been drilled it has probably been drilled in violation of the Rules and Regulations of the Oil Conservation Commission. They did apply to drill a well SE of the NW 31-20-31, but this was later cancelled.

If this is the well in question, we do not have in our records the volumes produced.

As soon as we have acquired the necessary reports, I would be pleased to furnish you with this information.
