DETAILED ACCOUNT OF WORK DONE AND RESULTS OBTAINED

Hole was filled with 10.8 # mud, 7" casing shot off at 2350', pulled, cement plug, consisting of 20 sacks of cement, set in the top of the small hole and bottom of surface casing. When measured up the top of the cement plug was found at 342'. The bottom of the plug was started at 400'. 355' of 16" casing cement from bottom to top was left in the hole.
