Dear Mr. Porter:

In March of this year Mr. J. E. Beddingfield filed and had approved Form C-102 "Notice of Intention to Re-Work" the subject well in the Red Lake pool. Subsequently, in April through July, the actual work was performed; however, in addition to reworking the Red Lake Pay (Grayburg) Mr. Beddingfield opened and treated the Empire Pay (Seven Rivers). After the workover, Mr. Beddingfield filed Form C-127 requesting an increase in the wells allowable to top allowable, stating that the Seven Rivers Zone had been perforated and acidized. When we then wrote to Mr. Beddingfield requesting the necessary forms to show the change in pool designation we became aware of the fact that the production from two separate pools is being commingled in the well bore.

Therefore, we are now writing you to see if anything in the way of an administrative order or special dispensation can be given Mr. Beddingfield in order that he may produce this well as is. Mr. Beddingfield did perform the work in good faith being unaware that what he did was not legal. He has expended a considerable amount of money in working the well over. The well should produce some oil which probably would not be otherwise recovered as both of the pay zones became very marginal very quickly. The royalty interest is the same for both zones.
