Dear Sir:

It is understood that the above referenced case was withdrawn November 9, 1984, from the New Mexico Oil Conservation Division's docket. Prior to this case being withdrawn, it was continued to an indefinite date at the Examiner's Hearing held October 31, 1984. It was the "continuance to an indefinite date" that prompted El Paso Natural Gas Company to return this well to normal scheduling.

This well was classified to an emergency hardship status upon receipt of Mr. Leslie A. Clements', New Mexico Oil Conservation Division Supervisor, District II, letter of May 29, 1984. El Paso immediately classified the well in such a manner that it would not be shut-in pending the outcome of the hearing. The case was first set for hearing on June 20, 1984, and continued every month until October 31, 1984, whereupon it was continued indefinitely at the discretion of the applicant. El Paso believes that more than sufficient time has been granted the applicant to resolve this problem and we further believe that this well should return to normal scheduling by November 15, 1984.

El Paso Natural Gas Company neither concurs with nor objects to this application. El Paso recognizes that some wells should definitely be recognized as "hardship" wells, but we will only recognize such wells upon order of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Division.

El Paso's policy is to take ratably between wells, between fields (prorated and nonprorated) and between states. Once a well is classified as a "hardship" well, it increases the non-controllable gas taken into our system and reduces our flexibility of pipeline TALKED TO BOB MANNING - EL PASO 11-5-84 C O9:00 AM.
