Report of the Commission

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION

The Commission on Inter-American Cooperation was established by the President of the United States in 1961. Its purpose is to study and report on the progress of inter-American cooperation in the fields of economic, social, and cultural development. The Commission is composed of representatives from the United States and the Latin American countries. Its first report, published in 1962, outlined the Commission's findings and recommendations. This second report, published in 1964, provides a detailed analysis of the progress made since the first report and offers further recommendations for improving inter-American cooperation. The report is organized into three main sections: economic development, social development, and cultural development. Each section contains a detailed analysis of the current situation, a comparison of progress since the first report, and a set of recommendations for future action. The Commission believes that continued inter-American cooperation is essential for the economic, social, and cultural development of the Western Hemisphere. It urges the United States and the Latin American countries to continue their efforts to improve cooperation in all these fields.
