DETAILED ACCOUNT OF WORK DONE AND RESULTS OBTAINED

April 5, we ran 2450 feet of new 7" casing. April 6, we placed 200 quarts shot of Nitro from 2500' to 2540' set with 96 hours bomb and cemented 7" casing with 30 sacks cement. Shot exploded on schedule and hole cleaned to total depth of 2558'. No water came into hole and oil production was increased from a show to 25 barrels in 24 hours. 7" casing was knocked off at approximately 2000' and pulled.
