# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE PROGRESS OF CHEMISTRY

The Committee on the Progress of Chemistry was organized in 1947 to study the progress of chemistry in the United States and to report to the National Academy of Sciences. The Committee has since that time held numerous public hearings and has received many suggestions from chemists and the public. The Committee's report is a summary of its findings and recommendations. It is divided into two main parts: a general statement of the progress of chemistry and a list of specific recommendations. The general statement is divided into four sections: the state of the field, the progress of research, the progress of education, and the progress of the profession. The list of recommendations is divided into four sections: the state of the field, the progress of research, the progress of education, and the progress of the profession. The Committee's report is a comprehensive and authoritative statement of the progress of chemistry in the United States and of the actions that should be taken to promote its further development.
