10. Plans for Restoration of the Surface.

- A. After completion of the well, all equipment not needed for operation will be removed.
- B. All unattended pits containing liquids will be fenced and the liquid portion allowed to evaporate before the pits are broken and backfilled.
- C. All waste associated with the drilling operation will be buried in place in a separate pit. Garbage and debris will be buried at least 3' deep. Any plastic material used to line the pits will be cut off below ground level, as far down as possible, and disposed of before the pits are covered.
- D. Surface restoration will be in accordance with the requirements of the Bureau of Land Management.
- E. The well site, if a producer, will be maintained and kept clean of all trash and litter or other foreign material which detracts from the surrounding environment. Equipment will be painted and maintained in accordance with good operating practice.

After the well site is cleaned and pits and sumps backfilled, any obstruction to the natural drainage will be corrected by ditching or terracing. All disturbed areas, including any access road no longer needed, will be ripped.

11. Other Information.

- A. Topography: Land surface is undulating to gently rolling and dunny. From an elevation of 3283' at the well site, the land surface slopes to the south toward the Pecos River at about 20-30 feet per mile.
- B. Soil: Soil is a deep fine sand underlain by caliche.
- C. Flora and Fauna: The vegetative cover is generally sparse and consists of mesquite, yucca, shinny oak, sandsage and perennial native range grasses. Wildlife in the area is that typical of semi-arid desert land and includes coyotes, rabbits, rodents, reptiles, dove and quail.
