9. WELL SITE LAYOUT:

- A. Exhibit "C" shows the relative location and dimensions of the well pad, mud pits, reserve pit, and trash pit, and the location of major drilling rig components.
 - B. Clearing and levelling of the well site will be required.
 - C. The pad and pit area is staked and flagged.

10. PLANS FOR RESTORATION OF THE SURFACE:

- A. After completion of drilling and/or completion operations, all equipment and other material not needed for operations will be removed. Pits will be filled and the location will be cleaned of all trash and junk to leave the well site in an as aesthetically pleasing condition as possible.
- B. Any unguarded pits containing fluids will be fenced until the pits are dry.
- C. After abandonment, all equipment, trash and junk will be removed and and the well site will be cleaned. Any special rehabilitation and/or special revegetation requirements of the surface management agency will be complied with and will be accomplished as rapidly as possible.

11. OTHER INFORMATION:

- A. <u>Topography</u>: The land surface in the area is undulating and duny. In the immediate area of the well site, land slope is to the northwest.
 - B. Soil: Top soil at the well site is sand.
- C. Flora and Fauna: The vegetative cover is moderate and includes mesquite, shinnery oak, sand sage, yucca, weeds, and range grasses. Wildlife in the area is that typical of semi-arid desert land and includes coyotes, rabbits, rodents, reptiles, dove and quail.
- g. <u>Ponds and Streams</u>: There are no rivers, lakes, ponds, or streams in the area.
- E. Residences and Other Structures: There are no occupied dwellings or other structures within a mile of the proposed well site.
