DETAILS OF WORK

Fred Phillips "D" No. 1 was spudded on July 18, 1958 and on July 19, 1958, 8-5/8" casing was set at 219' with 160 sacks cement. After waiting on cement, casing and water shutoff were tested with 400 pounds pressure for thirty minutes, which held with no drop in pressure.
