DETAILS OF WORK

WMA Joseph V. Aldrin No. 1. On July 15, 1958, perforated Hermosillo Gulch with four shots per foot 1500-1604. Ran tubing with 62' of tail pipe with HTS tool set at 1515'. Washed perforations with 500 gallons 15% mud cut acid. Breakdown pressure 850' and washed on vacuum. Natural swelling test stabilized 1-1/2 barrels per hour. Sand-oil flooded with 30,150 gallons oil and 10,000 pounds sand. Brake formation at 1600'. Injection rate 57 barrels per minute. Cleaned out 18' of sand to 1660'. 2" tubing landed at 1675'.

Joseph V. Aldrin No. 1 is currently being tested.
