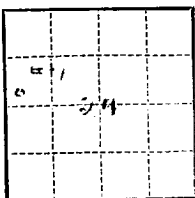

DETAILS OF WORK

Set 7"-23# Surface Casing at 30 feet with 7 sacks regular cement.
Air drilled to 1482 feet with no water entry into hole. Set 4 1/2"-
9.5# J-55 production string at 1481' with 40 sacks regular cement.
Pressure tested casing to 3000 psi for 30 minutes. Good cement job.
Top cement at 850 feet. No water entry into hole; so no water shut-
off job necessary.

I understand that this plan of work must receive approval in writing by the Geological Survey before operations may be commenced.

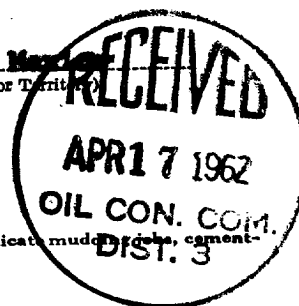
