Considerable expence has been incurred recently for swabbing this well to keep it flowing. Due to declining bottom hole pressure and low formation gas-oil ratio it appears that some type of artificial lift will have to be installed to operate the well. Permission is therefore requested to install a closed type gas-lift system and operate this well on gas lift. Gas for this purpose will be taken from Wells #4, C NE NW Section 5-25S-37E.

It is estimated that the input gas-oil ratio will not exceed 1500.
