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## The other one is Mike Hanagan. EXAMINER McMILLAN: Hanagan and what?

MR. BRUCE: H-A-N- -- that is Rob Hanagan.

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- 1 231H. For Case 20382, it's the Palmillo 10 State Com
- 2 232H. For the Palmillo State Com 233H, that's Case
- 3 20383. For Case 20384, it's the Palmillo 10 State Com
- 4 244H well.
- 5 There are two affidavits submitted in
- 6 support of all eight cases. First, if you turn to your
- 7 exhibit package, is the affidavit of Laci Stretcher, who
- 8 is the landman for Apache. She has been previously
- 9 qualified as an expert in petroleum land matters by the
- 10 Division. If you look at her affidavit, she includes
- 11 several exhibits, the first of which is a map that
- 12 outlines the basic area of the Palmillo 3 and state area
- 13 map and with the wells depicted there on Sections 3 and
- 14 10. It also indicates prior development of the Bone
- 15 Spring in the area by Apache. The second page of that
- 16 map shows the actual spacing units that are the subject
- of the applications and identifies the different wells.
- 18 Also attached to her affidavit is an
- 19 explanation and tract map that shows all the different
- 20 tracts that comprise the spacing unit that are being --
- 21 that are the subject of the application. And she lists,
- 22 with respect to each tract, the ownership and percentage
- 23 of ownership of the different working interest owners
- 24 and overriding royalty owners. In this case there were
- 25 some overriding royalty owners, and everyone was

- 1 provided notice with respect to this proceeding.
- 2 Whether or not there was a provision in their lease that
- 3 allowed them to be pooled, we went ahead and notified
- 4 all the royalty owners with respect to each of the
- 5 different cases that are at issue in this case.
- 6 Next in her affidavit, she attaches the
- 7 summary -- she attaches a C-102 for the wells, which is
- 8 Exhibit B, 241H, or if you look under each case in her
- 9 affidavit, there is a different exhibit number listed,
- 10 but it's the same basic type of exhibit, whether it's a
- 11 C-102. What we did is we referenced the well number on
- 12 the exhibit so that it's easy to follow with respect to
- 13 what particular well we're dealing with.
- 14 She also attaches to her affidavit the
- 15 well-proposal letters that were sent out and the
- 16 Authorization for Expenditure. There are different
- 17 amounts with respect to each of the different eight
- 18 wells, but they're about \$6 million wells that were the
- 19 subject of the AFE. She testifies that the costs that
- 20 were proposed were comparable to wells drilled to
- 21 similar length and depth and being drilled in the area.
- 22 She also describes the work that she did to try and
- 23 reach voluntary agreement. She made a diligent search
- 24 of the public records, conducted phone directory and
- 25 computer searches to locate all the contact information

- 1 for the parties, sent them well-proposal letters and
- 2 AFEs, and for anyone who requested it, provided them an
- 3 operating agreement.
- 4 She also requests that Apache be named the
- 5 operator of the spacing units and requests a risk charge
- 6 of 200 percent and overhead and administrative rates of
- 7 7,500 a month during drilling and 750 a month while
- 8 producing. She renders her opinion that Apache made a
- 9 good-faith effort to obtain voluntary joinder of the
- 10 working interests in the proposed wells and that there
- 11 are also no depth severances within the Bone Spring
- 12 Formation with respect to any of the eight proposed
- 13 units.
- 14 Also attached to -- also included in the
- 15 exhibit package is the affidavit of Mike Muncy. He is a
- 16 qeologist for Apache. He also has previously testified
- 17 before the Division, been accepted as an expert in
- 18 petroleum land matters. Mr. Muncy, in his affidavit, if
- 19 you look at the attachments, Attachment A is a structure
- 20 map that shows the proposed spacing units in the 3rd
- 21 Bone Spring and identifies the wells.
- 22 Exhibit B to his affidavit is a
- 23 stratigraphic cross section from A to A prime of the
- 24 different logs that were used to determine the
- 25 correlation and identify the thickness of the sands

- 1 associated with it. If you look on that map, the target
- 2 zone in the Bone Spring is highlighted in green. He
- 3 also includes, as Exhibit B to his affidavit, the Bone
- 4 Spring sand soapy [sic; phonetic] map, which identifies
- 5 the spacing units and shows the location of the wells
- 6 that are used to comprise his cross -- his cross section
- 7 from A to A prime.
- 8 Mr. Muncy offers his opinions that the --
- 9 he's conducted a geologic study. There are no
- 10 geological impediments or faulting that would interfere
- 11 with horizontal development in any of the eight spacing
- 12 units that are the subject of the application, that each
- 13 quarter-quarter section of the units will contribute
- 14 more or less equally to production, and the preferred
- 15 well orientation is east to west, and the producing
- 16 interval for each of these wells will be orthodox and
- 17 comply with the Division setback requirements.
- Both Mr. Muncy and Ms. Stretcher also offer
- 19 their opinions that the granting of these applications
- 20 is in the interest of conservation and the protection of
- 21 correlative rights.
- 22 And we ask that Exhibits A and B be
- 23 admitted into evidence.
- 24 EXAMINER McMILLAN: Exhibits A and B in
- 25 Cases 20377 through 20384 may now be accepted as part of

- 1 the record.
- 2 (Apache Corporation Exhibits A and B are
- 3 offered and admitted into evidence.)
- 4 MR. DeBRINE: That concludes my
- 5 presentation. We ask that these cases be taken under
- 6 advisement.
- 7 EXAMINER McMILLAN: Okay. Any unlocatable
- 8 interests?
- 9 MR. DeBRINE: There were -- oh, actually,
- 10 we also -- Exhibit C is also my Affidavit of Publication,
- 11 which indicates that there were some unlocatable
- 12 interests. We got some -- some cards came back
- 13 returned. We published notice with respect to the
- 14 application in the paper of circulation in Eddy County
- 15 identifying each of the different owners that were
- 16 notified of the applications, and they're all
- 17 specifically listed so everyone with regard to Apache's
- 18 title work identified owning an interest in any of these
- 19 spacing units was either provided actual notice or was
- 20 given notice by publication in accordance with the
- 21 newspaper advertisements.
- 22 We also ask that Exhibit C be admitted into
- 23 evidence.
- 24 EXAMINER McMILLAN: Okay. Exhibit C may
- 25 now be accepted as part of the record.

25 EXAMINER McMILLAN: The same comment I give

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any questions.

- 1 to all the geologists. Put your last cross section on
- 2 one map and show the structure map on another map. It's
- 3 too much information to look at at one time.
- 4 MR. DeBRINE: We will do that,
- 5 Mr. Examiner. Thank you.
- 6 EXAMINER BROOKS: That's why I object to
- 7 people coming in with copies of Midland Map Company for
- 8 land purposes. There's so much information on it that
- 9 you can't see any of it.
- 10 EXAMINER McMILLAN: Do you have any
- 11 questions?
- 12 EXAMINER GOETZE: Well, I just want to
- 13 comment on your Affidavit of Publication. I find it
- 14 quite amusing that you were not able to locate --
- 15 New Mexico. So kudos there.
- MR. DeBRINE: Well, we -- we -- it's better
- 17 safe than sorry. So it's been my practice just to list
- 18 everybody in that notice just in case we don't miss
- 19 someone because sometimes things fall through the
- 20 cracks.
- 21 EXAMINER GOETZE: State might not show up.
- 22 We understand.
- MR. DeBRINE: And it doesn't cost a whole
- lot more to throw another name on there.
