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1 MR. EXAMINER: Good morning, everybody. 2 This hearing will come to order. We're going to go into 3 the docket. I want to make a brief announcement for the 4 general consumption. Take a seat, take a seat.

5 As you all know, we have a new rule and it's in effect now and there are certain implementations that we 6 need to make sure that you understand. From now on 7 whenever you are presenting an interval well, you know, 8 something like from that kind of a case, I would 9. appreciate it if you could give us the well construction 10 diagram at the hearing so that we know where the 11 completed interval is at. 12

As you all know, a completed interval is a new term where we implemented a new rule. It's not just for this area. Therefore, you can present the well any way you want it as long as you give us the construction and tell us where the completed interval is. That would be really appreciated.

Most of the cases we have today, the information is for that area and the drilling of the well. And you may not have that well complete and you may submit after the hearing. But I want you to do it to make sure that you present the well construction in the area and not after the fact.

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As you all know, this is a new rule and it might

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Page 3 be subject to interpretation. Here we have a technical 1 examiner to help you; Mr. Brooks is here. And we can 2 also help you with any technical interpretation that you 3 may have in trying to comply with that rule or trying to 4 present your case before the OCD or the OCC, whatever 5 the case may be. So if you need any interpretation 6 please let us know. We did one on Monday, and we would 7 8 appreciate it if you understand how they can implement the project. I really liked it. We are working with 9 10 you.

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Okay. And I want to remind everybody, I have a full house today, about the new policy that was put in place just this February about this issue of continuing applications and the cases dismissed without prejudice. So I want to make sure everybody understands that some of the cases stay on the docket for years and then it's crossed off the docket.

And the recommended decision is that we need to 18 19 continue for only three times or four times and then it has to be heard or dismissed without prejudice. 20 So I 21 want to make sure -- I think I told you that we 22 grandfathered any continuances before February 2nd. So 23 if you are continued for 10 times or 20, it didn't 24 count. So whenever you think your case has been 25 continued for three times, please make sure you prepare

Page 4 to get it heard or dismiss it yourselves or we will 1 dismiss it for you without prejudice. 2 You know, I talked about an example that I see of 3 what is going on in the field about operations, how 4 5 negotiations are going on. I see one thing placed on 6 you, the fact that we would like you to, you know, 7 negotiate. So coming to the hearing and if you actually come to the hearing, because you have the right. Of 8 9 course you have the right to come to a hearing. Nobody 10 is saying don't come to the hearing. But in the interest of similar processes I would 11 appreciate it if you guys can try to negotiate. And 12 when it's broken down in negotiations come to the 13 hearing. Not everything is coming to the hearing and 14 then the docket is closed out that we are -- you know, 15 we have short staff. We don't have enough to deal with 16 every process of the case that you may have that could 17 18 have been settled if you negotiate the case. So I 19 always talk about this. And I think it helps you so much if you bring it to the hearing, we decide it, and 20 you may not like it. So I encourage you to negotiate 21 22 among yourselves. 23 Now I wanted to say, are there any questions or

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Okay, then we're going to call today's docket.
Today is April 26th and we're going to call Docket
Number 13-12. And first order of business is to call
the dismissals and continuances.

5 On page 1, case 14657 is dismissed. On page 2, 6 case number 14814 is continued to May 10th. Then go to 7 page 4, case number 14810 is dismissed. All the cases 8 from case number 14819 up to 14824, all those cases are 9 continued to May 10th; 14819, 14820, 14821, 14822, 14823 10 and 14824 are all continued to May 10th.

On page 5, case number 14825 is continued to 11 May 10th. Case number 14826 is continued to May 10th. 12 Case number 14828 is dismissed. Page 6, case number 13 14829 is dismissed. Case number 14830 is dismissed. 14 On page 7, case number [14687] will be dismissed without 15 prejudice. And I want to read this out for the record 16 to tell you what I just said about continuing for three 17 times and then four times they continue the hearing. 18 So it had to be dismissed without prejudice. 19

Let me read it into the record, the case that will be dismissed without prejudice. This is application of Cimarex Energy Company for a non-standard oil spacing and proration unit and compulsory pooling for, Chaves County, New Mexico will be dismissed without prejudice.

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Page 6 On page 8, case number 14804 will be dismissed. And are there any other dismissals at this time? 2 MR. RANKIN: Mr. Examiner, Adam Rankin on З behalf of OXY USA. We'd like to dismiss case 14798. 4 MR. EXAMINER: What page? What page? 5 б MR. RANKIN: It's on page 4. MR. EXAMINER: 14798, correct. 7 MR. RANKIN: That's correct, to dismiss. 8 MR. EXAMINER: Dismissed, okay. Let the 9 record reflect that case number 14798 is dismissed. 10 MR. BRUCE: Mr. Examiner, on page 4 at the 11 top, I can't remember if you got this case or not. But 12 13 the Mewbourne Oil Company case 14810, that should be dismissed. 14 15 MR. EXAMINER: Yes, I didn't say that. Any other dismissals. 16 Case number 14798, yes, I'm going to take it from 17 the pile. I don't have to hear it anymore. 18 Any other dismissals, continuances? Now what we 19 are going to do, we have a bunch of cases today, much 20 are contested. So what I will do first is to call case 21 number 14812. That case, we're not going to hear it 22 today. We heard it last time and I just need to call it 23 to collect some new information. 24 And then we have two cases, 14613 and 14647, then 25

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Page 7 we are going to follow the order of the docket. But I 1 2 was informed of this one by Mr. Hall that -- everyone is present now, Mr. Hall? 3 4 MR. HALL: Yes, sir. 5 MR. EXAMINER: They are here now? MR. HALL: Yes. 6 7 MR. EXAMINER: Okay. So after these cases are done then we're going to go to the docket. We're 8 9 going to call it that way. Is that going to present any problem for anybody? 10 11 MR. HALL: You're going to do the Division's 12 cases first? 13 MR. EXAMINER: Yes. So you are ready to go. 14 MR. HALL: Yes, sir. 15 MR. EXAMINER: Okay. So we're going to 16 continue that way and see where we get today. I want to warn everybody that it might spill over into Friday, so 17. 18 I hope everybody can stay here until Friday.
