9	the Santa Fe law firm of Kellahin and Kellahin, appearing
10	on behalf of the Applicant, and I have two witnesses to be
11	sworn.
12	EXAMINER BROOKS: Will the witnesses please stand
13	and state their names for the record?
14	MS. VAN BLARICOM: Rebecca Van Blaricom.
15	MR. RICHARDSON: David B. Richardson.
16	(Thereupon, the witnesses were sworn.)
17	REBECCA E. VAN BLARICOM,
18	the witness herein, after having been first duly sworn upon
19	her oath, was examined and testified as follows:
20	DIRECT EXAMINATION
21	BY MR. KELLAHIN:
22	Q. Would you please state your name and occupation?
23	A. Rebecca E. Van Blaricom it's V-a-n
24	B-l-a-r-i-c-o-m and I'm the manager of land for
25	Richardson Production Company.

On prior occasions have you testified before the 1 2 Division and qualified as an expert in petroleum land matters? 3 4 Yes, I have. And pursuant to your employment, have you been 5 responsible on behalf of Richardson for identifying the 6 7 interest owners in the spacing units involved in this case and trying to find those parties? 8 9 Yes, I have. Α. MR. KELLAHIN: We tender this witness as an 10 11 expert. 12 EXAMINER BROOKS: She is so qualified. 13 (By Mr. Kellahin) Let me have you orient us as to what we're doing. Would you turn to Exhibit Number 1. 14 15 this is an exhibit that you prepared? 16 Α. Yes, it is. 17 Identify for me what this shows. Q. This shows the spacing for the Fruitland Coal, 18 Α. 19 which is the east half of Section 7, 29 North, 14 West. 20 The Fruitland Coal spacing is 320. 21 Q. Describe for me how the east half of the section 22 is subdivided. 23 Α. The northeast quarter is owned 100 percent by

with for leasing. 1 You've shown on this display the proposed well 2 0. location, the approximate location of the well? 3 4 Α. Yes, I have. And that's on your tract in the northeast 5 quarter? 6 Yes, it is. 7 Α. The well is to be what type of well? 8 Q. It will be a commingled Pictured Cliff-Fruitland 9 Α. Coal well, gas well. 10 And if you dedicate the northeast quarter to the 11 Q. well, you're on 160-acre spacing? 12 If I dedicate the northeast quarter, it will be 13 320 for the Fruitland Coal. 14 15 Q. And for the Pictured Cliff? Α. 160. 16 All right. So the consolidation of the interest 17 Q. owners are those parties remaining in the southeast 18 quarter? 19 20 Α. Yes, it is. 21 Q. Do you have an exhibit that shows a tabulation of 22 all the owners? Α. Exhibit 2 will give you a tract-by-tract 23 24 interest, as well as a summary of all the uncommitted

acreage.

- Q. Let's turn to page 2 of the summary. At the bottom you've indicated that Richardson has about 95 percent of the spacing unit?
 - A. Yes, we do.

- Q. Have you been as of today successful in obtaining voluntary agreement with any of the interest owners shown as uncommitted?
 - A. Not -- No, I have not.
- Q. Let's talk about your efforts to obtain voluntary commitment.
- A. First we sent out our AFE -- Well, we would have sent out lease offers in the summer of 2001. And then in November of 2002 we sent our first mailing requesting either participation, once again leasing, or to sell their minerals.

And then I did some follow-up phone calls with parties. And when I found that parties had perhaps transferred their interests, we sent out new letters to owners and once again followed up with telephone calls to those owners when we could locate them. And I used the Internet as well as phone books and any other devices I could to try to locate people or locate phone numbers, because -- to talk to them one on one, to explain.

- Q. What does Exhibit 3 represent?
- A. That is a brief summary of the contacts I made

with all the uncommitted parties.

- Q. When was the well first proposed to these interest owners along with the proposed well cost statement?
 - A. November 2nd, 2001.
- Q. When we turn to Exhibit 4, this package that has been collated and stapled, what does this represent?
- A. It will represent all correspondence with each uncommitted owner.
 - Q. At this point do you believe you have exhausted all good-faith efforts to obtain voluntary agreement from the owners that are uncommitted at this point?
- A. Yes, I do.
 - Q. Do you have a recommendation to the Examiner as to overhead rates to apply to the parties being committed by the pooling order?
 - A. It will be -- What we would recommend would be \$5000 for drilling overhead rates and then \$500 for operational rates.
 - Q. Are those rates consistent with the level of costs that you have obtained from the Division in other compulsory pooling cases in this area?
 - A. Yes, they are the same.
 - Q. As part of your efforts to consolidate the interest owners, you submitted to them a proposed AFE?

- 1 A. Yes, I did.
 2 O. When I look at
 - Q. When I look at Exhibit 5, does that represent the AFE that you sent to these people?
 - A. Yes, it is.

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- Q. To the best of your knowledge, is it still current and accurate?
- 7 A. Yes, it is.
- Q. How is this AFE prepared? Is it prepared by
 9 Richardson?
- 10 A. Oh, yes, it's prepared by our engineer at
 11 Richardson, yes.
- Q. To the best of your knowledge, it's consistent with the current cost of drilling such a dual completion well?
- 15 A. Yes, it is.
- 16 Q. Have you received any objection from anyone as to 17 these costs?
- 18 A. Oh, no, no objections.
- 19 Q. Can't even get them to talk to you?
- 20 A. They'll talk to me --
- 21 Q. They won't commit.
- A. -- but they won't commit. When I can reach them they'll talk to me, but they won't commit.
- MR. KELLAHIN: That concludes my examination of this witness. We move the introduction of her Exhibits 1

1 through 5. EXAMINER BROOKS: Exhibits 1 through 5 are 2 admitted. 3 4 **EXAMINATION** BY EXAMINER BROOKS: 5 I believe I recall that Richardson has a separate 6 Q. 7 entity, Richardson Operating Company, that operates their wells; is that correct? 8 9 Yes, Richardson Operating will be the operator, 10 named operator. You're requesting that Richardson Operating 11 Q. Company is the operator of the proposed well? 12 Yes, sir, I am. 13 Α. 14 Q. Okay. This is to be an east-half spacing unit, 15 as I understand it? 16 Yes, sir. Α. 17 And is this from the surface to the base of the 18 Pictured Cliffs? Yes, it will be. 19 Α. 20 Now, you have indicated that this is to be --Q. 21 that your plan is to downhole commingle. 22 Α. Yes, sir. Will that be the subject of a separate 23 Q. 24 application? 25 Yes, it will. Α.

KELLAHIN: It's on the top of Exhibit 1. 1 (By Examiner Brooks) The top of Exhibit 1, okay. 2 It's 1254 from the north line and 1939 from the 3 Α. east line. 4 1254 from the north and 19- --5 Q. -- -39 from the east. A. 6 EXAMINER BROOKS: -- -39 from the east. 7 8 I guess that's all I have, Mr. Stogner. 9 EXAMINER STOGNER: Yes, I have a couple of 10 questions, if I may. EXAMINER BROOKS: Go ahead. 11 12 **EXAMINATION** BY EXAMINER STOGNER: 13 The Application is for compulsory pooling for the 14 Q. 15 Pictured Cliffs in the northeast quarter --16 Α. No --17 MR. KELLAHIN: Mr. Examiner, 18 THE WITNESS: -- the Fruitland Coal. 19 MR. KELLAHIN: -- that's not necessary for the Pictured Cliffs. The only reason we put it on the docket 20 21 is to notify the owners in the coal that it would be a 22 commingled wellbore and that production would be allocated 23 between the two pools. 24 But there is no uncommitted owner in the northeast quarter. 25

EXAMINER STOGNER: Okay, that was the gist of my 1 question at this point. 2 EXAMINER BROOKS: So the actual pooling order, 3 then, should read from the surface to the base of the 4 Fruitland Coal, since you're not --5 THE WITNESS: Right, yes --6 EXAMINER BROOKS: -- you're not --7 THE WITNESS: -- I was in error. 8 EXAMINER BROOKS: -- doing the Pictured Cliffs. 9 Okay, the witness may stand down. 10 MR. KELLAHIN: Let me ask the witness another 11 question. 12 FURTHER EXAMINATION 13 BY MR. KELLAHIN: 14 15 Q. Exhibits 9 and 10 behind the geologic displays, have you reviewed those two exhibits? 16 17 Α. Yes, I have. 18 Q. And are they consistent with the notification 19 lists that you were utilizing for these parties? 20 Α. Yes, they are. 21 MR. KELLAHIN: Mr. Examiner, we would ask that 22 you also introduce Exhibits 9 and 10, which are our 23 certificates of notification for this hearing. 24 EXAMINER BROOKS: Exhibits 9 and 10 are admitted. 25 MR. KELLAHIN: That concludes my examination of

9	DIRECT EXAMINATION
10	BY MR. KELLAHIN:
11	Q. Mr. Richardson, for the record, sir, would you
12	please state your name and occupation?
13	A. David B. Richardson, President, Richardson
14	Production Company.
15	Q. Do you hold a technical degree, Mr. Richardson?
16	A. Yes, I do.
17	Q. What is that degree in?
18	A. In geology, from the University of Oklahoma.
19	Q. On prior occasions have you testified before the
20	Division?
21	A. Yes, I have.
22	Q. This is your company and your prospect?
23	A. Yes, it is.
24	Q. Have you analyzed the geology involved in this
25	Application?

16 Yes, I have. 1 Α. MR. KELLAHIN: We tender Mr. Richardson as an 2 expert witness. 3 EXAMINER BROOKS: He is so qualified. 4 (By Mr. Kellahin) Mr. Richardson, I want you to 5 look at Exhibits 6, 7 and 8, and before we talk about them 6 7 specifically, do you have an opinion about the risk associated with the Fruitland Coal gas formation involved 8 9 in this well? 10 Α. Yes, I do. The statute provides a maximum penalty for the 11 Q. Division, and that's cost plus 200 percent. Are you aware 12 of that? 13 Α. Yes. 14 15 Q. In your opinion, is the risk associated with this 16 well based upon that maximum limit? A. Yes. 17 18 Q. What is it? 19 Α. It should be the highest allowable. 20 Q. Let's talk about your reasons to support that 21 opinion. 22 Α. Okay.

This is a nine-section area of the proposed Ropco

If you'll turn to Exhibit 6, identify for us what

we're looking at.

7-1 well. As a reference point, the San Juan River is approximately a mile to the south. The oil well spots are old Gallup wells. Most of those have been plugged. There are several recent Pictured Cliffs and Coal completions in the area.

- Q. Is it your current exploration strategy to drill commingled wellbores with the Coal and the Pictured Cliffs?
 - A. Yes, it is.

- Q. When you talk about the risk, what are the factors that cause you to conclude the risk is the maximum?
- A. In this particular case, we're on the far edge of the San Juan Basin, far western edge. This well, the coal is only approximately 560 feet deep. It outcrops three miles to the west.

Of particular concern to us is the San Juan River. It intersects the outcrop to the west, and we're concerned --

- Q. You've shown that river on the display?
- A. Yes, I have.
- Q. That outline on Section 13, 18 and 17 is the approximate location of the river?
 - A. Yes, it is.
 - Q. Let's look at the structure map. If you'll look at Exhibit 7, that gives us a structural reference point for the coal?

- A. That would be Exhibit 8.
- Q. I'm sorry. Give us the structural reference point for the coal on the structure map.
- A. Okay, this is -- the structure map shows a gentle northeast dip of the -- into the center -- northeast part of the Basin. The coal is approximately 560 feet deep here. As you can see, the further west you go, you have the outcrop.
- Q. Let's look at the display that shows the cumulative production in the area.
- 11 A. Okay.

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- Q. On the bottom of that display you've shown

 13 Pictured Cliff and Fruitland Coal cum production?
- 14 A. Yes, I have.
- Q. When we look at the coal production, you currently find that information on wells to the east of your location?
- 18 A. That's true.
- 19 Q. Is there a water component associated with the 20 risk here?
- 21 A. Yes, there is.
 - Q. And what is that?
- 23 A. High water production.
- 24 Q. Generally, what do these kind of wells cost?
- 25 A. These wells -- a commingle well is approximately

\$220,000, and a single Pictured Cliffs well is about 1 2 \$40,000 less. So it's justifiable to you to try to commingle 3 Q. 4 both of those reservoirs together in a single wellbore? 5 It's necessary, yes. Any other factors that associate reasons for the 6 Q. 7 risk factor penalty, Mr. Richardson? The shallow depth and low bottomhole pressure. 8 Α. What kind of rates would you anticipate for this 9 well? 10 In the beginning it's very low production. As we 11 Α. dewater it, we're anticipating up to approximately 300 MCF 12 13 a day. 14 Q. So these are very low rate wells once you reach 15 the point at dewatering? 16 Α. Yes. 17 MR. KELLAHIN: All right. That concludes my 18 examination of Mr. Richardson. 19 We move the introduction of his Exhibits 6, 7 and 20 8. 21 EXAMINER BROOKS: Exhibits 6, 7 and 8 are 22 admitted. 23 **EXAMINATION** 24 BY EXAMINER BROOKS: Mr. Richardson, you're aware that the Division's 25 Q.

usual practice has been to provide for a 156-percent risk 1 penalty in the case of Fruitland Coal wells, are you not? 2 A. Yes, sir. 3 And do you believe that the reasons you have 4 5 suggested justify a departure from that practice in this 6 case? Yes, I do. 7 Α. 8 EXAMINER BROOKS: Okay, Mr. Stogner? 9 EXAMINER STOGNER: Yes, I have some questions based on this in particular. 10 11 EXAMINATION BY EXAMINER STOGNER: 12 Now, I'm looking at Exhibit Number 8, and you're 13 Q. referencing other Fruitland Coal gas production in Section 14 1, two wells in Section 5, one well in Section 13, the 15 Number 3X. 16 When I look down in Section 13, is that the oil 17 well with the gas hachmarks on it? 18 Α. 19 Yes. All right. And then in Section 6, which well in 20 Q. Section 6 is that? 21 The producing well is the Bushman Federal 6-1. 22 Α. That would be the one designated that's not 23 Q. 24 plugged --25 Α. Yes.

We

-- correct? Now, is that -- Let's look at the 1 Q. well in Number 6. Is that well currently producing? 2 Yes, it is. 3 Α. And what's the rate? 4 Q. 5 Α. Today's rate is about 350 MCF a day. 6 Q. Any water? Yes, between 200 and 400 barrels per day. 7 Α. 8 Q. Okay, now how long has this well been producing? 9 Α. Since 1999. Okay. What was the initial rate or --10 Q. About -- Approximately 15 MCF. 11 Α. Fifteen. What was the water rate at that time? 12 Q. It was very high. 13 Α. The rates that you just mentioned in that Well 14 Q. Number 6, is this typical for the wells in this particular 15 16 area? This seems to be abnormally high. 17 Α. Abnormally high. What would be a normal high, 18 Q. then? 19 We don't know because most of these are new 20 wells. 21 22 The well in Section 1 is producing approximately 50 MCF per day, and it's remained fairly constant at that 23 24 level.

The wells in Section 5 and 8 are new wells.

don't have that much production, but we are experiencing an incline in the production.

Q. Now, the well down in Section 13, is that a

- A. It is, we purchased this well from another operator who attempted a completion in the Fruitland. It's very shallow, about 200 feet, and it's never had any production.
 - Q. Okay, so that well --
- 10 A. Zero production.

Richardson well?

- 11 Q. Now, you show a .5 MM on your exhibit.
- 12 A. That must have produced that out of the Gallup.
- 13 Q. So that --

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- A. That hasn't produced that out of the Fruitland Coal. At least I'm not aware of any production from the Fruitland coal.
- We haven't sold any gas there.
- Q. Were any of your coal gas wells depicted on this
 exhibit that you've mentioned in Sections 1, 6 and 5, are
 they also subject to a compulsory pooling order?
 - A. I believe the ROPCO 8-1 and the 5-2 and the 5-4.
 - Q. Okay. Do you remember what the risk penalty factors were on those wells?
 - A. I believe 156.
 - Q. Are you expecting this well in section 7 to be

any different from the ones up in Sections 1, 6 and 5?

- A. The risk would be, it would be the furthest west and the highest structural well, and the high water production closer to the river.
- Q. Are any of these other wells that we've discussed in Sections 1, 6 and 5, are they also downhole commingled with the PC?
 - A. Yes, they are.

- Q. Okay, would downhole comminging a well -- would that lower or raise the risk, in your opinion?
- A. From an economic point it would lower the risk; from an engineering point it could increase the risk.
 - O. How would it increase the risk?
- A. If one zone produces considerably more water than the other, say if the PC produces 300 barrels a day of water and it's continuing to do so, and one dewaters faster, it's going to restrict the flow from the other zone.
 - Q. Would this have potential harm to the PC?
- A. I don't think so, it's just going to take longer to dewater and affect your economics.
 - Q. So the PC is not water-rate-sensitive, in your opinion?
 - A. It is somewhat, yes. It also dewaters.
 - Q. Okay, again, where is the outcrop of the Coal?

It would be probably -- I know the coal mine is 1 in Section 35 to the northwest, so probably in Section 11 2 or 10, the east half of 10 or the west half of 11 would be 3 4 the coal outcrop. What is the nature of the coal -- or does it 5 differ, the nature of the coal, as far as fracturing, 6 7 cleating, the closer you get to the outcrop versus the other direction as you go deeper into the Basin? It seems to have the same frac gradient as 9 further to the east. There's not much difference. 10 Now, the water effect here you have talked about, 11 Q. this would come from water introduced into the coal from 12 the river and from just natural water flow? 13 Α. From natural water, and we're hoping that it's 14 not recharging. 15 Are you seeing any indication of that in those 16 17 other wells? 18 Α. No, as far as the salinity, the TDS's remain very high, so that would tell us initially that we're not seeing 19 20 a recharge. EXAMINER STOGNER: I have no other questions. 21 Mr. Brooks? 2.2 23 EXAMINER BROOKS: Neither do I at this point. You may stand down. 24
