THE APPLICATION OF THE NEW IN THE MATTER OF: MEXICO ASPHALT AND REFINING COMPANY FOR AN ORDER WHENGIN: THE RESPECTIVE UNITS OF PRORATION WITHIN THE WEST LUSK, BARBER, EAST LUSK FIELDS, AND THE NEWLY DISCOVEMED BENSON AREA, ALL WITHIN EDDY COUNTY, PRODUCING ASPHALTIC BASE CRUDE OIL, SHALL BE ALLOWED TO PRODUCE OVER AND ABOVE THE CURRENT ALLOWABLE, INSOFAR AS SUCH UNITS ARE CAPABLE AND INSOFAR AS SUCH MAY BE DONE WITHOUT WASTE, UP TO 100 BARRELS OF CRUDE OILDAILY FOR PURCHASE BY THE APPLICANT FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUPPLYING THE UNITED STATES ARMY ENGINEERS WITH ASPHALT AND ROAD OILS TO BE USED IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF AIRBASE PROJECTS IN NEW MEXICO AND TEXAS, AND THE NEW MEXICO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT FOR PAVING OF ROADS WHERE FEDERAL APPROVAL OF SUCH PAVING HAS BEEN GRANIED, AND WHEREIN SUCH PRODUCTION AND PURCHASE FOR SUCH PURPOSES ARE RATIFIED SINCE THE EXPIRATION OF A SIMILAR ORDER, NO. 476, WHICH EXPIRED DECEMBER 1, 1942.

The Oil Conservation Commission, by law invested with jurisdiction as the oil and gas regulatory body of the State of New Mexico, hereby gives notice of the following hearing to be held at Santa Fe, New Mexico:

Case No. 43

In the matter of the application of the New Mexico Asphalt and Refining Company for an order wherein; the respective units of proration within the West Lusk, Barber, East Lusk Fields, and the newly discovered Benson Area, all within Eddy County, producing asphaltic base crude oil, shall be allowed to produce over and above the current allowable, insofar as such units are capable and insofar as such may be done without waste, up to 100 barrels of crude oil daily for purchase by the applicant for the purpose of supplying the United States Army Engineers with asphalt and road oils to be used in the construction of airbase projects in New Mexico and Texas, and the New Mexico Highway Department for paving of roads where Federal approval of such paving has been granted, and wherein such production and purchase for such purposes are ratified since the expiration of a similar order, No. 476, which expired December 1, 1942. This case is set for 10 A. M., August 3, 1943.

Any person having any interest in the subject of said hearing is entitled to be heard.

BY GOVERNOR DEMPSEY: I wonder if you don't want to amend that Application?

BY MR. LUCK: I ask leave to amend it to that extent.

WALTER P. LUCK

being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

BY MR. LUCK: We should like to enter into a stipulation with the counsel for the Commission whereby all testamentary and oral evidence heretofore introduced at a former hearing be used in support of this Application. I believe that has been filed with the Commission, and is now in your possession.

Particularly, the letter is from the U. S. Geological Survey, pertaining to waste, in which they -- I will briefly outline the letter -- in which they stated that if 100 berrels allowable of asphalt be permitted to be produced daily, that no damage or waste would result to the reservoir. Also, particularly, the evidence of Neil Miller, Geologist of Carlsbad, to the effect that no waste would result in the production of 100 barrels per day per producing unit, and to the effect that he has contracted to sell asphaltic oil to the New Mexico Aschalt and Refining Company, and that unless each producing unit be permitted to be increased to 100 barrels per day, we would not be able to supply the refineries. And the testimony of myself in that connection, stating that we have contracts ti th the United States Army Engineers, whereby we are obliged to deliver -- to manufacture and deliver -- asphalt for use in Army Airbases throughout New Mexico and Western Texas.

At this time I want to testify that we still have these contracts, and that the situation is not changed. That the demand is still present, and that we have been unable to supply the demands by, I would say, 25 per cent of their demands.

We have been running approximately 800 barrels of asphalt crude per day from all sources available where asphalt is produced in New Mexico. I am not prepared to say whether they could produce more, but we haven't heard anyone complaining that we have not been taking the oil. We have been taking it ratably, and as much as they could produce.

In this particular case, insofar as it affects the inclusion of the Benson Area in Eddy County, New Mexico, we have Mr. Harvey Yates, the owner of those leases producing that oil. I would like to have him on the stand.

HARVEY YATES

being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

- BY MR. KELLY: Will you make a statement as to whether or not your lease in the Benson Area could make 100 barrels per day without waste?
- BY MR. YATES: This is my first experience with heavy asphalt oil, but I believe you could.
- BY MR. MELLY: How much is one of your wells producing now?
- BY LR. YATES: It could produce 200 barrels per day.
- BY GOVERNOR DEMPSEY: He asked what one would produce?
- BY MR. YATES: By pumping 500 barrels of fluid we produce 230 barrels. We have pumped 700 barrels of fluid with 150 barrels of oil.
- BY ILR. LUCK: By continuous pumping could you increase that production?
- BY MR. YATES: I believe by pumping more fluid we get more oil, by pumping less fluid, naturally, we get less oil.
- BY MR. KELLY: What is the proportion?
- BY MR. YATES: In pumping 50 barrels of fluid we get 5 barrels.
- BY MR. LUCK: You have one producing well now?
- BY MR. YATES: Yes sir.
- BY MR. LUCK: And are drilling another?
- BY MR. YATES: Yes sir.
- BY MR. LUCK: What is your program with respect to development?
- BY MR. YATES; I intend to keep the rig running as long as I can

WALTER P. LUCK (Recalled)

- BY MR. LUCK: I have contracted for and on behalf of New Mexico
 Asphalt and Refining Company, to purchase all the allowable
 produced that may be established for Mr. Yates, regardless.

 We expect to purchase this oil ratably with all other fields.
- BY GOVERNOR DEMPSEY: What is the capacity of your refinery?
- BY MR. LUCK: The capacity is about 2100 barrels of vacuum distillate, running about 800 barrels a day now. However, we have the facility to increase it to 2500 barrels per day.
- BY MR. KELLY: In your opinion, or the opinion of your geologist, is any waste being taken out of your pools outside of the Benson pool?
- BY MR. LUCK: Not more than normally incident to any other taking of oil.
- BY MR. WELLY: The Commission orders the case be taken under advisement.
