
Dear Mr. Richardson:

Thank you for your letter of February 3, 1985, concerning the case of Mrs. Guinevere Brady. As offered in our earlier correspondence, U.S. Geological Survey geologists did visit the Farmington area to try to determine the character and origin of soil gas on Mrs. Guinevere Brady's property, as part of an overall study of gases in the San Juan Basin. The general duestion appeared to be: Is the gas in question a relatively typical gas found in soils in many localities, or could it be natural gas leaking from nearby production wells or tree the gas-producing reservoir rocks at depth throughout the area?

Samples were taken of the contents of polyvinyl chloride pipes stuck at some previous time into the soil of the Brady property. This gas, upon analysis, proved to be only air-that is, no potentially harmful gas was leaking up those pipes at the time of our sampling. He do not know how or why the gas-leakage situation now on the Brady presently appears to be different from previously observed, but the samples we obtained certainly bould not pose any danger.

A different situation was found in soil gas taken from the reighboring Roberts property on Camino Rio Street, however. That gas contained about 72 percent methane and 24 percent carbon dioxide (see enclosed table showing chemical analysis results). The methane content of the gas could be potentially dangerous.

In order to compare that gas on the Roberts property with locally produced natural gas, samples were taken from the only two nearby gas wells. Analysis of chemical compositions and carbon-isotope character clearly shows that the Roberts-property gas is different from the deep natural gas.



Except that it is evidently not related to natural gas production, we cannot cell from our sample results the origin of the soil gas of the Roberts property. Meventheless, because there is potential for hazard in the gas found on the Roberts property, we are transmitting our findings to Er. Frank Chavez, of the New Mexico Oil Conservation Division, who helped us in our survey. We hope that our information will aid local authorities in marking with homeowners to address the matter of soil gas leakage.

Dear Congressman Richardson:

The following is in response to your letter of December 6, 1985, concerning the problem of "natural gas" in the soil in the area of Mrs. Guinevere H. "Winnie" Brady's home in Farmington, New Mexico.

The problem afflicting Mrs. Brady's property is both distressing and perplexing. Early in the course of this problem, this office spent in excess of \$250,000 locating and plugging an old well in the vicinity of Mrs. Brady's home. This well was initially suspected as the source of the gas, however, we believe the complete manner in which we carried the plugging operations on this well precludes it from further consideration. A special gas analysis conducted by the U. S. Geological Survey in June of 1984 showed that a gas sample collected from the problem area bears little resemblance to samples taken from the producing horizons existing below the area. A later sample shows this same dissimilarity. Unfortunately the test results are insufficient in and of themselves to pinpoint the source of the gas.

At this point we have no reason to believe that any well or any other facility under our jurisdiction is the source of the gas. However, with the impetus of your letter, I am turning my file on this case over to our Environmental Bureau to have them take one more look at the situation and to make recommendations for further action or study.

At this time there are no funds available to this agency which could be used to provide the kind of direct help Mrs. Brady apparently seeks. Our only "extra" funds are in the Reclamation Fund. These funds are used to plug abandoned wells when no other resources are available. In the past, attorneys in this Division and in the Energy and Minerals Department have carefully reviewed the range of available State resources for problems such as this and they have yet been unable to identify any.

We believe we acted promptly and properly in this matter. Our reservoir of ideas and options as to the problem is currently exhausted. The only thing that occurs to me is the possibility of your meeting with representatives of the city, the gas company, the insurance companies, and us sometime when you plan to be in Farmington. Perhaps through your

good offices, enough movement could be achieved to give Mrs. Brady a chance to move back into here house.

Dear Mr. Stamets:

One of my constituents, Guinevere H. "Winnie" Brady, has contacted me on a matter of concern. I am now writing to you on her behalf.

Ms. Brady lives in Farmington and in November, 1981 the presence of a high level of gas was found beneath her home. Since then numerous and extensive contacts have been made with government agencies, all without success in solving the problem. Details are noted in the enclosed materials.

At this point Ms. Brady, a retired lady in her 60's, has been living away from her paid-off home for four years. I am very concerned in this matter and am writing to determine if there is any assistance your agency could provide. In particular, I have been advised that there is a pool of funds into which oil producers pay to handle emergencies. I wonder if such a pool might be tapped in this situation.

I am advised that under the New Mexico contitution that aid to private individuals is limited. However, I respectfully request you consider whether this could be deemed an expenditure for public purposes. I am informed of the following factors which might cause it to be so:

- 1. The house might possibly explode and thus cause harm to the public at large.
- There is a school three blocks away.
- 3. There is a park nearby which sometimes contains hundreds of persons.

4. The danger of the house is a factor depressing to property values in the neighborhood.

I also suspect that if aid can be provided, it could be channelled through a local public body rather than to Ms. Brady in order to take necessary protective measures.

I would appreciate your careful evaluation of this situation. At your earliest convenience, I would then be grateful to know your findings and views. Please route a response to me through my Gallup office at the address noted at the top of the first page.

Thank you very much for any and all assistance you can provide on Ms. Brady's behalf.
