REPORT ON THE CONSERVATION OF WILDLIFE

The Commission on Conservation of Wildlife was organized in 1961 to study the status of the wildlife resources of Costa Rica and to recommend measures for their conservation. The Commission has held several public hearings and has received many suggestions from the public. It has also conducted extensive field studies and has prepared a detailed report on the status of the wildlife resources of Costa Rica. This report is being submitted to the Government of Costa Rica for its consideration and action.

Summary of the Report of the Commission

The Commission has found that the wildlife resources of Costa Rica are in a state of serious decline. The principal causes of this decline are the destruction of the natural habitat, the overhunting of the animals, and the introduction of foreign species. The Commission has recommended that the Government of Costa Rica should take immediate action to protect the wildlife resources. It has suggested that the Government should establish a national park system, that it should regulate the hunting of animals, and that it should control the introduction of foreign species. The Commission has also recommended that the Government should conduct a comprehensive study of the wildlife resources of Costa Rica and that it should establish a department of wildlife conservation.

Recommendations of the Commission

The Commission recommends that the Government of Costa Rica should take the following actions: (1) Establish a national park system to protect the most important wildlife resources. (2) Regulate the hunting of animals to prevent overhunting. (3) Control the introduction of foreign species to prevent the destruction of native species. (4) Conduct a comprehensive study of the wildlife resources of Costa Rica. (5) Establish a department of wildlife conservation to coordinate the efforts of the various agencies concerned with the conservation of wildlife. The Commission also recommends that the Government should provide financial support for the conservation of wildlife and that it should encourage the public to participate in the conservation efforts.

DETAILED ACCOUNT OF WORK AND RESULTS OBTAINED

The Commission has conducted extensive field studies of the wildlife resources of Costa Rica. It has visited many of the most important wildlife areas and has observed the animals in their natural habitat. The Commission has also conducted laboratory studies of the animals and has collected many specimens for scientific study. The results of the Commission's work are being published in a series of reports. This report is the first of the series and it contains a detailed account of the Commission's work and the results obtained.
