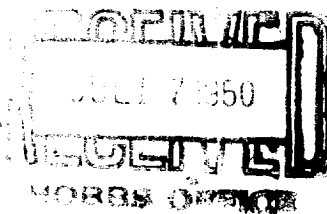

1. The first part of the document is a letter from the President of the United States to the Congress, dated January 1, 1861. 9. The ninth part of the document is a report from the Secretary of the Commerce, dated January 1, 1861. It provides a detailed account of the state of the commerce, and includes information on the trade, the shipping, and the industry. The Secretary states that the commerce is in a good state of development, and that the government is able to maintain its trade.

10. The tenth part of the document is a report from the Secretary of the Finance, dated January 1, 1861. It provides a detailed account of the state of the finance, and includes information on the money, the banks, and the interest. The Secretary states that the finance is in a good state of development, and that the government is able to maintain its money.
