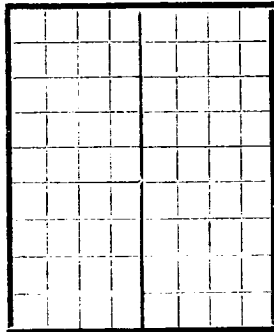

The status of a bond for this well in conformance with Rule 39 of the General Rules and Regulations of the Commission is as follows:

If changes in the above plan become advisable we will notify you before cementing or landing casing. We estimate that the first productive oil or gas sand should occur at a depth of about Wildcat feet.

Additional information: In cementing casing Halliburton process will be used. Cement will be allowed to set required length of time before drilling plug and testing.
