Gentlemen:

Reference is made to your letter of April 5, 1963, wherein you request administrative approval of an exception to Rule 107 (e) for your state of New Mexico "AE" Well No. 6 to be located in Unit L of Section 12, Township 18 South, Range 34 East, Vacuum Abo-Reef Pool, Lea County, New Mexico.

It is our understanding that you propose to set 2 7/8-inch OD production casing at approximately 8950 feet and cement the same with approximately 1250 sacks of cement. Inasmuch as no corrosion problem is expected and measures will be taken to counteract the anticipated paraffin accumulation, this office has no objection to your proposed method of completion.

Texaco Inc. is therefore hereby authorized to complete the aforesaid well in the above-described manner, subject to the provision that the cementing program for the casing must meet with the approval of the Hobbs District Office of the Commission.
