THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I

SECTION 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of Elections.

Section 5. The Congress shall determine the Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives, and may punish for Contempt either Branch, and may suspend its Members for Disorderly Behaviour.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and shall hold their Offices during the Term for which they shall be elected, and shall be ineligible to be again chosen into the same Office, until they shall have held such Office for two Years.

Section 7. The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States.

Section 8. The Congress shall have Power to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, to regulate Commerce among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes.

Section 9. The Congress shall have Power to coin Money, to regulate the Value thereof, and the Coinage.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance or Confederation with any foreign Nation, or State, or enter into any Agreement or Compact with any foreign Nation, or State, or enter into any Agreement or Compact with any foreign Nation, or State.

Section 11. The Congress shall have Power to declare War, to issue Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and to grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal to privateers.

Section 12. The Congress shall have Power to fix the Standard of Weights and Measures.

Section 13. The Congress shall have Power to suspend the Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus, when the Public Safety may require it.

Section 14. The Congress shall have Power to establish and regulate Militia, to provide for calling them forth to execute the Laws of the United States, to suppress Insurrections, and to repel Invasions.

Section 15. The Congress shall have Power to make and enforce Laws, which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.
