MINERAL REPORTS ON WELLS

The following report was prepared by the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, in response to a request from the State of Texas for information regarding the mineral resources of the State. The report is based on the results of a survey conducted by the Bureau in 1911, and is intended to provide a general overview of the mineral resources of the State, and to indicate the areas in which further investigation is warranted.

The report is divided into two main parts. The first part, entitled "General Description of the State," contains a general description of the State, and a list of the principal mineral resources. The second part, entitled "Detailed Description of the State," contains a detailed description of the mineral resources of the State, and a list of the areas in which further investigation is warranted.

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MINERAL RESOURCES OF THE STATE OF TEXAS

The mineral resources of the State of Texas are extensive, and include a wide variety of minerals. The principal minerals are oil, gas, coal, iron, copper, and lead. The oil and gas resources are the most important, and are found in the northern and central parts of the State. The coal resources are found in the southern part of the State, and the iron, copper, and lead resources are found in the western part of the State.
