T. R. Andrews	No. 1-B	32-22-38
T. R. Andrews	No. 5-A	32-22-38
C. L. Hardy	No. 5-L	20-21-37
Watkins	No. 1-0	29-22-38

This reclassification is necessitated by the fact that the wells are producing at a ratio in excess of the ratio allowed for an oil well classification.

The wells are to be shut in on January 1, and will remain shut in until you have complied with the provisions of Commission Order No. R-1670 pertaining to the Blinbry Gas Pool.
