FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS IN THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE COMMISSION

Due to decline in production below the economic limit, it is proposed to temporarily abandon above well. 5½" casing will be cut at approximately 4500' and pulled. 20 sx cement will be spotted from 4500-4435', mud laden fluid 4435-3800' and 45 sx cement from 3800-3650'. Well will be temporarily abandoned at approximate P.B. depth of 3650' pending possible use for water injection well for secondary recovery of wells producing from the Queens formation.
