Gentlemen:

This is with reference to our telephone conversation of June 13, 1960 regarding the plugging of your Steeler "A" No. 2 located in Unit M of Section 20, T-23-S, R-37-E.

Effective plugging of this well would entail setting plugs of 25 sacks of cement at 2499 feet, 1200 feet and at the base of the 9 5/8" casing. However, if there is the possibility of sticking tubing or encountering some other hazard in re-entering the well then a 25 sack plug in and out of the base of the 9 5/8" casing would be the absolute minimum for effective plugging of the well. Also, it will be necessary to set a 10 sack cap and permanent marker in the well.
