

Attachment (Form 9-301a - Lamppyon No. 6)

It is planned to drill the above well with rotary tools to an approximate depth of 9450 feet through the McKee Sand members of the Simpson formation. Surface formation is caliche and sand. The most probable casing program, which will be used in the event that seven inch I.D. casing is set on top of the McKee sand, is as follows:

The surface casing will be cemented with 300 sacks and the cement circulated to the cellar. The intermediate casing will be cemented with 1300 sacks of cement. The production casing will be cemented with 700 sacks.

An alternate production casing program which will be run in the event that a later decision is made to set pipe through the McKee Sand and then perforate the casing is as follows:
