Total depth 3357. It is proposed to pull tubing and rerun with Baker Cement retainer set at 3295'. Will Squeeze off all perforations below 3295' and plug hole from 3357' to 3295' with 150 Sacks El Toro Common cement to shut off bottom hole water and protect our offset wells C. D. Woolworth #10-13 from water encroachment. Upon completion of this work, well will be shut down for future exploitation of upper gas zones when necessary.

## DETAILED ACCOUNT OF WORK DONE AND RESULTS OBTAINED

Total depth 3453. Treated pay formations from 3460 to 3453 with 1000 gallons Dowell "X" solution. Started swabbing 1 hour after treating. Well started flowing. In 12 hours flowed 27 barrels oil per hour cutting 6% water natural through tubing. 620# pressure on casing. Next day flowed 24 hours natural through 1/4" choke on 2 1/8" tubing. 152 barrels oil cutting 4% water. Gas measured 950,000'. Casing pressure 1200#. Following day flowed 24 hours natural through 1/4" choke on 2 1/8" tubing. 137 barrels oil cutting 4% water. Gas measured 850,000. Following day flowed 122 bbl. oil, 14% water and 85 barrels oil with 14% water the next day. Yesterday the well flowed 24 hours natural through 1/4" choke. 100 barrels fluid cutting 10% water. Casing pressure 1280#.
